## Souris Dragger Freed; Fergus Locked in Ice

F.K. MacNutt, local district marine agent, department of transport, said last night, "our fishermen are somewhat disappointed about the ice trap, when we get the word that another has suffered similar difficulties."

Mr. MacNutt reported that the CCGC Wolfe, which left Charlottetown late Tuesday night, had freed the Souris dragger Colville Bay from the fishing season. The dragger was about several miles off the northern exposure to the Gut of Canis, and had led her through the Gut to the Canis lock.

The Wolfe reached the dragger early yesterday and after backing very heavy ice reached the lock at 12:30 in the afternoon.

The Colville Bay left Souris Monday to begin the fishing season. She asked for assistance Tuesday evening and the Wolfe sailed from Charlottetown before midnight.

**FERGUS STUCK**

About the same time word was received by the department that the M.V. Fergus, which plies between Picton, Charlottetown, Souris and Newfoundland, was locked in heavy ice outside Picton Harbour.

Mr. MacNutt said that he had not issued any instruction to the skipper of the Wolfe regarding the Fergus, but he expected that she would divert in her course back to Charlottetown, and break the freighter clear.

In outlining the extent of the ice around Island shores, Mr. MacNutt said that there has been almost no improvement in the picture during the past several days. In fact with prevailing northeasterly winds more ice is being observed along the north shore.

Heavy ice stretches from west of Cavendish, through East point across to Cape Breton, and down to the west of Picton Harbour. He said that there is little indication that the ice is deteriorating. What is needed to start this action is warm weather and good rains.

**Hydrogen Power Claimed Nearer**

LONDON (Reuters)—The British newspaper Pravda claims a breakthrough for Soviet scientists toward controlled thermonuclear fusion—in effect controlled H-bomb explosion.

The communist party newspaper quoted Wednesday by the official news agency, says scientists at the Kurchatov Institute announced the production of induced temperatures of 60,000 to 100,000 degrees centigrade in a plasma—gas confined by a magnetic field—and maintained it for a comparatively long period.

**Princess Meis Sotoman In Old Painting Setting**

LONDON (CP)—Princess Alexandra of Kent, 26-year-old cousin of the Queen and Angus Ogilvy, blue-blooded Scotsman, were married Wednesday amid a medieval pageantry in Westminster Abbey.

Crowds cheered, bells pealed, bagpipes shrieked and Queen Elizabeth looked vaguely glum as the ceremony took place.

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## PRINCESS ANNE IS SURPRISE

LONDON (Reuters)—Princess Anne, Queen Elizabeth's 12-year-old daughter, caused the main surprise at Wednesday's wedding of Princess Alexandra to Scottish businessman Angus Ogilvy.

Though recent photographs of Princess Anne have shown her growing into a lanky girl, she appeared sophisticated Wednesday.

At first glance, the guests in western Westminster Abbey and television viewers had difficulty in recognizing the composed young chief bridesmaid, who kept a regal eye on the four little girls and two little pages who toddled up the Abbey behind the bride.

For the first time in public, Princess Anne wore her hair swept up on top of her head in a simple "top-knot" with a broad, white band holding it in place.

Mr. Pearson will fly to London May 1 from Toronto after addressing the annual meeting of The Canadian Press April 30.

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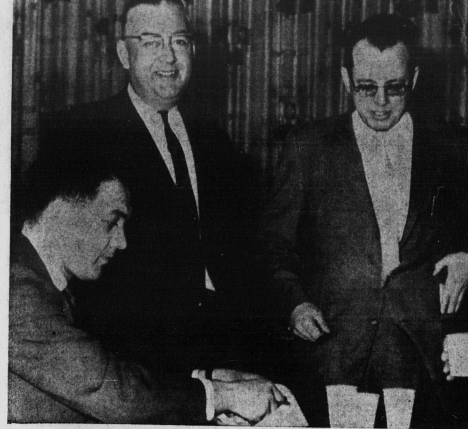
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**BOARD OF TRADE DELEGATES REGISTER**

## Pearson Launches Moves To Heal Racial Division

Mr. LeGere told 250 delegates across Canada: "I feel at this moment Canada is standing at a very difficult crossroads in the relationship between our two main ethnic groups."
