

Atlantic Manager's Conference Held

SUMMERSIDE — During the week of November 29 an Atlantic Manager's Conference was held at St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, N.B., under the direction of G.L. Lawson, Regional Director of the Unemployment Insurance Commission. Attending were, office managers from the Maritime Provinces, regional branch heads from Moncton and representatives from the head office at Ottawa, including the newly appointed Director General, R.L. Beatty. Attending from P.E.I. were A. E. Gervan, Summerside office manager, and C.L. Winchester, manager of the Charlottetown branch.

The main purpose of the conference was to discuss future plans and operation of the Commission, as related to the proposed reorganization and installation of mechanized pay, which is to be completed within the next three years. Other major topics included the role of the local office in the new organization, staff relations, financial administration, staff development, collective bargaining and personnel administration.

Not Much Sun In November

SUMMERSIDE — Temperatures varied between a mild 63 degrees on November 29 to a chilly low of 21 on November 16 and 17, in figures released Saturday by the meteorological branch of the Department of Transport at Summerside.

The daily weather summary shows only eight sunny days during the month, and 6.8 inches of snow fell, including 4.2 inches during the winter's first storm November 17. There was .4 inches recorded on November 15, with a trace on November 13, 14, 16, and 19.

During the month, rainfall measured was 1.39 inches, compared to the normal of 4.19 inches, and the normal snowfall of four inches.

The mean maximum temperature for the month was 46.7 degrees, compared to the normal of 42.8, and the mean minimum was 35.2 degrees, compared to the normal minimum of 31.4 degrees.

The Christmas "Open House" for the Charlottetown Sheltered Workshop for Retarded Adults was held Saturday afternoon, in the Workshop quarters located in the vacant Catholic Orphanage building, on the Malpeque Road just outside Charlottetown.

The workshop is under the direction of Gordon MacDonald, workshop director who is assisted by Herb Roper and Mrs. Roger Goss, along with 12 volunteer workers from Charlottetown.

The aim of the Open House is to give the 30 trainees, the opportunity to socialize with the public, and to give the public a chance to socialize with the trainees.

On entering the grounds Saturday afternoon I found two male trainees busy supervising the parking of a large number of cars. After our car was parked, we were taken on a tour of the woodworking operation. Here I was amazed to find a wide variety of woodworking displays, including various tables, chairs, bird houses and etc. The woodworking is under the direction of Mr. Roper.

As you came in the main door you were greeted by a volunteer worker who ushered you into the main room gaily decorated in line with the Christmas season.

Here you were welcomed by a lady trainee, who asked you if you would like a cup of tea. A delicious lunch was also served which I learned later, was made by the female trainees under the supervision of the volunteer workers.

The kitchen was also a beehive of activity, with trainees and volunteers preparing food and washing dishes.

On display in the main room were various Christmas decorations, including Christmas centerpieces, candles, greeting cards and wreaths. All work done by the trainees can be purchased for a modest price.

The trainees attending the workshop, which is held each week from Monday through Friday range in ages from 18 to 35. Although various trainees are from different locations in the province, the majority are from Charlottetown. Some come from private homes, foster homes and institutions.

The volunteer workers take turns one day a week attending the workshop, assisting the trainees as they cook, sew, do handicraft, woodworking and participate in a drama, art and music.

Robert Jardine of Freetown changed his plea to guilty on a charge of failing to yield the right of way at an intersection. He was fined \$10 and costs.

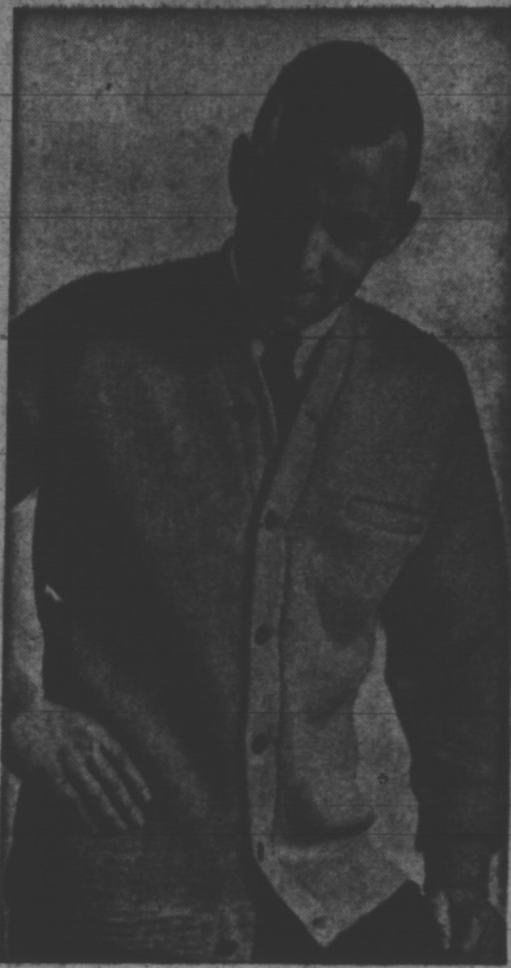
Placement Officer To Nfld.

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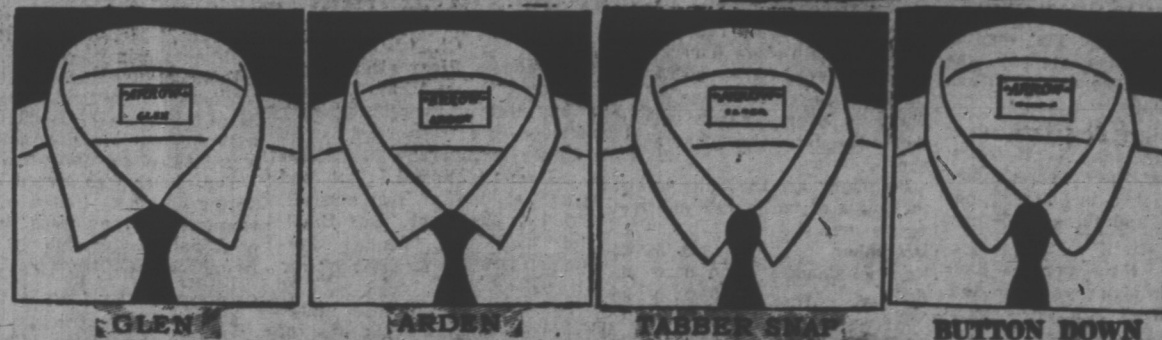
