### NEW CAPITAL FOR CHINA.

It may be confidently predicted that none of the civilized powers of the world will ever again send ambassadors to Peking. The situation is now far enough advanced to make it plain that if the Chinese empire is to maintain its integrity it must be at the cost of such concessions to other nations as shall form absolute guaranties against outrageous and sudden treachery on the part of the Chinese government. There are very few guaranties that China can give which the rest of the world would accept as worth anything; but first among these is the removal of the capital to a point where the powers holding diplomatic relations with China can reach and protect their representatives readily and effectively. They cannot take the chances again of a siege of the legations in the interior of China.

The essential condition is that the capital of China shall be within reach of the naval forces of other nations. This would be a hard and intolerable condition to exact of a power holding equality in the international family. But China is not such a power and cannot be treated as such. She will have to accept the position in which her late eccentricity has placed her, and yield to the demands for security exacted by those with whom she associates.

There ought to be no difficulty in arranging this transfer of the seat of government. Nankin, the ancient capital of the Middle Kingdom, of China proper, would be entirely satisfactory. But Peking, which only by good fortune have been taken by the allies after a long and arduous military expedition and which might not have been taken at all if the Chinese had been prompt in flooding the surrounding country, can never again be the residence and trap of foreign ambassadors—Boston Post.

A curious incident showing that the Boers are getting short of arms, occurred at Warmbad, where some of De Wet's men were captured. The prisoners were found to be in possession of rifles to which new roughly-made stocks had been fitted. These rifles turned out to be some of the two hundred found by General Baden-Powell after having been buried by the Boers, and pointed out by Kafirs some time ago. When they fell into the hands of the British they were taken to the top of a kopje and their stocks burned, but they appear to have been found again by the Boers and made serviceable by being fitted with new stocks.

In the Cape House of Assembly a few days ago the treason bill was passed to a third reading by a vote of 46

against 37. The clause of the third chapter of the bill, disfranchising convicted rebels for five years, was adopted by a majority of ten on Sept. 10. The House rejected an amendment by Mr. Molteno, to the effect that the rank and file should not be punished, but should be called upon to give security for their future good behavior.

Andrew Lang, in Longman's tells these stories of the siege of Ladysmith: "There is a true tale of one of the Ladysmith garrison who came into a large fortune during the leaguer; but the only luxury he could buy with his new wealth was a pound or two of canary seed. The soldier-servant of a friend of mine was blown to pieces early one morning by a shell. He lived long enough to tell my friend that he was so glad that he had first got his breakfast ready."

The War Office has received the following despatch from Lord Roberts:—"Released British prisoners report that Delarey has imprisoned hundreds of Boers who refused to break their oaths of allegiance, and fight again. Of those in the field, the greater part are fighting under compulsion. Boer women clamored for the shooting of the British prisoners."

Dr. Leyds will open an enquiry into the complaint of Belgians and Dutch who allege that they were expelled from the Transvaal by the British. These complaints will be forwarded to the powers with exhaustive reports. The latter include complaints made against the campaign carried on by Lord Roberts.
