Fire Protection Discussed At Montague Meeting Last Night

A special meeting of the Montague Town Council with the members of the villages of Murray River, Murray Harbour and Cardigan, was held at the Town Hall at Montague last night for the purpose of discussing fire protection in each of the several localities. The Georgetown Town Council was unable to attend the meeting.

It was stated by Mayor Yeo of Montague that in view of the prohibiting-by-law, and because of the town insurance, it was not possible for the Montague pumper to leave the town. However, he continued, the council would be ready to assist the other localities in every way possible which would be at their disposal.

Mr. George Ferguson of Murray River stated that the villages required fire equipment immediately, but that the villages were not in a financial position to acquire such equipment. He proposed that the Provincial Government loan each village a sum of money immediately sufficient to provide the locality with adequate equipment for fire protection, and that the government be reimbursed through the per-capita grant. This idea met with the general approval of the meeting.
