## Commerce Chamber Head Forecasts Record Income

A forecast that 1959 would be a year in which income and volume of output would attain new records was made last night by A.C. Ashford, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and the Toronto Dominion Bank, when he addressed the annual meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade.

Claud R. Hunter succeeded William Hayward as president of the organization with A.D. Cameron being named vice president. A. Wadsworth Gaudet was re-elected as secretary.

Referring to the forecast for the current year, Mr. Ashford said: "While inflation and unemployment will probably continue as the central problems facing us, they will not prevent the achievement of new peaks in volume of output, in total employment, and in national income."

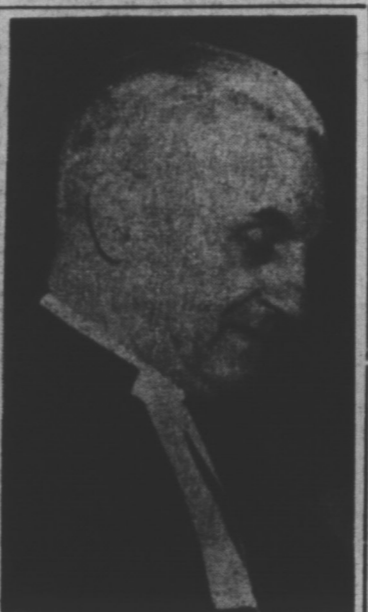
