LEGISLATIVE.—The Northwest Territories House of Assembly will meet for the despatch of business on the 7th December.

TEACHER'S MEETING.—There will be no Teacher's Meeting in the Baptist Church this evening, on account of the absence of Rev. Mr. Gordon from this city.

W. F. M. S.—The annual meeting of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society in connection with St. James' Church, was held last evening. After the report of the Bible Women, supported by the Society in Trinidad was read, the Rev. J. D. Murray, at present laboring in Tennessee in connection with the Southern Presbyterian Church of the United States, but at one time a Missionary in Antioch in connection with the Presbyterian Church of the Lower Provinces, made a very interesting and instructive address.

A FORGERY.—The recent departure from the Province under suspicious circumstances of a Melville farmer named Allan McLeod, has, the Patriot says, led up to the discovery of a series of forgeries, amounting to about \$1,000. During the past year McLeod has had several notes discounted at 100 of the city banks; and the forgeries consist in the signing of the names of certain responsible parties to renewal notes without their knowledge or consent. The Bank of Nova Scotia, E. H. Norton & Co. and McKinnon & McLean are among those who have been swindled. A few nights before McLeod left Melville, his dwelling house, which was heavily insured, was destroyed by fire.

MATRIMONIAL.—The marriage of Joseph H. McNeill, of the engineering staff of the steamship Britannia, and Amelia McKinnon, was solemnized at the residence of the brides parents, Euston St., at half-past five o'clock this morning in the presence of the relations and friends of the contracting parties. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. D. Southerland. The groom was supported by his brother Mr. William McNeill, and bridesmaids were Miss Scott and Miss Annie McKinnon, sister of the bride. The popularity of the happy couple was evidenced by the large number of presents received. The groom is a son of Archd. McNeill, Esq., and the bride a daughter of Alexander McKinnon, Esq., both of this city. After a sumptuous breakfast at Mr. McKinnon's residence Mr. and Mrs. McNeill left for their future home in Boston. THE EXAMINER heartily joins in the congratulations.

Personal.

Rev. A. E. Burke is visiting the city. A decided coldness is reported between the King of Saxony and the German Emperor. The second son of Lord Dufferin is to be married to Miss Flora Davies, of New York. The new volume of Field Marshal Count von Moltke's memoirs, which has just been published, contains a number of letters to and from his wife before and after their marriage. The volume gives delightful pictures of the simple home life of Queen Victoria and her family at Balmoral, where General Von Moltke visited in 1855 as aide to the Prussian Crown Prince Frederick. A curious feature of all the volumes yet issued is that Gen. Von Moltke only makes rare and casual references to Prince Bismarck. It is not known whether Gen. Von Moltke purposely avoided making more extended references to him in his letters or whether it is due to editing.
