Potato Prices Decline Causes Little Worry

The present drop in potato prices has caused little alarm here, as it is felt the price level will improve, and one man predicted it would reach \$3.00 per bag in the near future.

While a reliable report Wednesday night indicated the price had dropped in the province to \$2.10 per bag, one shipper, Horace Willis, told Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae yesterday he is paying \$2.50 per 75-pound bag.

The \$2.10 price was being paid by a number of shippers, including one of the island's largest handlers, it was learned reliably.

Theatre Alliance May Form To Allow Fine Programs Here

Tomorrow in Halifax an attempt will be made to form a Maritime Theatre Alliance.

Robert Dubberly, theatre director at the Confederation Centre, will be meeting with Alexander Gray, director of the Neptune Theatre in Halifax in an effort to form an alliance of Maritime theatres providing touring companies with a ready-made circuit of theatres with proper facilities.

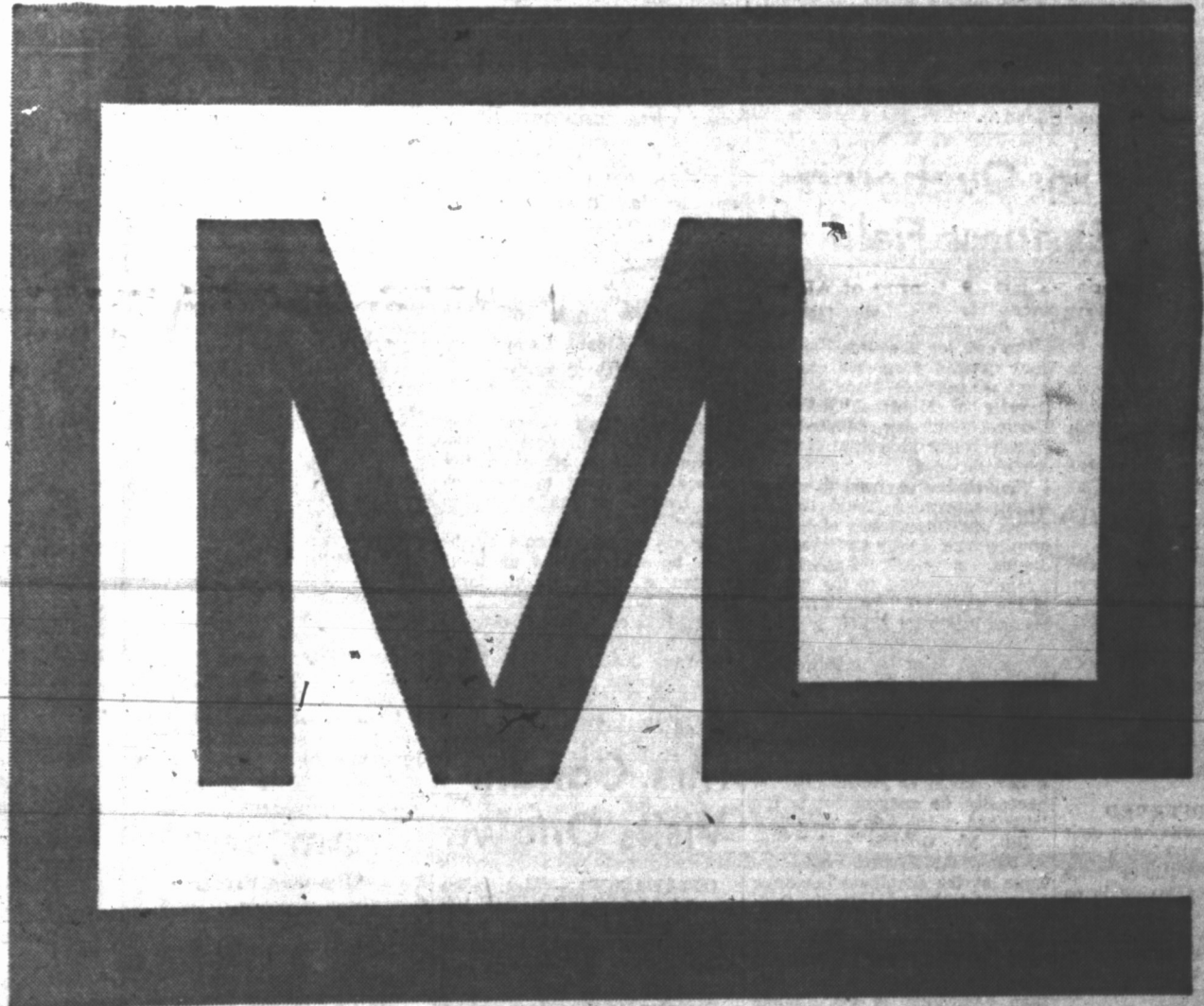
The alliance would be made up of those theatres already existing in the Maritimes and any new ones, such as the proposed theatre in St. John's, Nfld.

In explaining the need for such a group or alliance Mr. Dubberly said, "at present, costs of bringing a ballet company, a symphony orchestra, or a major Canadian attraction to one city in this region are almost prohibitive, which is why the Maritimes have so few of them whereas central Canada and even western Canada can get these attractions on a regular basis."

"Many of these companies," he pointed out, "have achieved important reputations even beyond Canada's borders, but except for unusual circumstances, such as last year's Centennial festival, they can't afford to come down here on their own, and isolated cities in the Maritimes haven't been able to bring them down."

"We hope that by providing a number of cities with good theatre facilities and reasonably short transportation jumps be-

International relations chairman, Reginald MacNevin, told the meeting about Brotherhood Week which is to be held the week of Feb. 21. Public speaking demonstrations were made by James Lee, Donald Fraser, John Simpson and David Darcy. Critical comments on the short speeches were made by past president George Scantlebury.

Preparations were made for a "Do It Now" campaign stunt to be held this evening in the downtown area of Charlottetown. Stephen Rush announced that Mayor-elect Cox has consented to discuss the "Do It Now" campaign.

A special guest speaker, Walthen Gaudet, is to be present at the next Jaycee meeting.

Confederation Centre Trying To Arrange Production Tour

The Confederation Centre is trying to organize a Maritime tour of Les Jeunes Comedians' production of "L'Amour Medecin".

John Paterson, public relations director of the centre, said last evening he has written over a dozen universities in the Maritimes inviting them to participate in the proposed tour and he has been in contact with the officials of the company.

The Jeunes Comedians is one of Canada's newest and most highly-rated acting companies. It has recently finished a tour of Western Canada and is at the moment playing in Toronto.

It is a group of seven young French Canadians who are studying at the National Theatre School in Montreal. The play "L'Amour Medecin (Love is the Best Doctor)" is a comedy-ballet by Moliere.

The arrangements for the Maritime Tour of Les Jeunes Comedians are in the initial planning stages; if plans are finalized the tour will begin sometime after the 25th of February.

This year's tour of Western Canada was the second such tour for the company. John Hirsch, director of the Manitoba Theatre Centre, said in the program for the 1965 tour, "Last year for the first time thousands of English-speaking students saw for the first time in their lives a French play performed by French-speaking Canadians. The response was enthusiastic and everyone who saw the show wished them well and hoped they would return."

"But they are here (Winnipeg) for another reason. You have read of the trouble between Quebec and the rest of Canada, some of you must have come to the conclusion that any difficulty between French Canadians and English Canadians might be the result of simply not knowing enough about one another."

"The only way we can create a truly unified Canada is through increased knowledge, and therefore increased understanding, of all the people who live in this country."

Murray Harbor Reports Deficit

MURRAY HARBOR — A deficit of \$2,514 for 1964 was reported by village clerk John Gosbee at the annual meeting of the village of Murray Harbor.

Lester White was elected new commissioner, replacing Mr. Gosbee whose three-year term had ended. Other commissioners are Wallace Penny and Sheldon Hume.

The commissioners reported that during the year a new truck was purchased for fire-fighting purposes, and the fire hall painted.

The property of the late Montford Herring was purchased for the village and the dwelling demolished. The community hall was extensively repaired and a new heating system installed.

The town also painted the exterior of the public library and laid a new concrete walk from the road to the library.

At the meeting, money was voted for the care of the sports field and for weekly cleaning of the village dump.

An office is to be located in the fire hall and will be open one day a week for ratepayers to pay taxes and carry on other business throughout the year.
