## Provincial Exams Starting Monday

A total of 3,718 students in grades eight, 10 and 12 will be writing provincial examinations in 16 Island centers Monday.

The exams last through the week.

In addition some 30 students will be writing grade 12 supplementaries.

Summerside, Charlottetown and Montague will see the heaviest concentration of examination writers. A total of 622 students will write at both Summerside and Athena high schools in Summerside; 612 in Charlottetown and 562 in Montague.

Gordon Bennett will be presiding examiner in Charlottetown; Winston Currie at both Summerside and Athena and Dr. J.C. Murphy in Montague.

## Sentence Is Deferred In Dog Shooting Case

SUMMERSIDE — Trueman Jeffery, Summerside was convicted in police court last evening of unlawfully shooting a dog owned by Gordon Simmon and had sentence deferred by Magistrate R. S. Hinton, QC until July 8.

The charge resulted from the shooting of a black and white dog named Dingo at the raceway on the afternoon of June 6. Evidence was given at an earlier hearing last Friday.

The magistrate said the shooting was the cruelest thing I can think of, to kill an animal with small bird shot.

The magistrate said accused who is also the town dog catcher evidently had been waiting to shoot the next dog that came to the raceway as he had a shotgun nearby. He pointed out it is a crime to shoot a dog the same as it is to shoot a neighbor's cow if he happens to wander on your property.

The magistrate added that he hoped the case would teach a lesson to some people to have respect for pets and those who cherish them.

Mr. Jeffery Campbell, counsel for Mr. Simmon, termed the incident "a vicious, malicious and uncivilized slaughter of a dog. This court cannot let people like Mr. Jeffery take the law in their own hands," he stated.

## O'Leary Ratepayers Decide To Extend Sewage Service

O'LEARY — A special meeting of ratepayers of this village last night decided unanimously to provide 500 feet of sewage to service the land development on Beachwood Drive.

This development is located west of Barclay Street, south of the Community Hospital.

The motion to provide the service was moved by Bernard Shea and seconded by Ralph Adams.

The meeting also gave approval to a building permit to Douglas Ferguson to build a new home in the development.

O'LEARY DAY — The meeting discussed the plans for O'Leary Day to mark the centennial planning to be held on a park, however, they turned down a proposal from the hospital board to use the land for a park and a second parcel, for use as senior housing, be traded with the village to wipe out a debt of some \$2,500 owing by the hospital for sewage services.

The meeting felt payment for the land should be negotiated separately. It was felt, also that land for the senior housing was not the responsibility of the village, since the housing was for surrounding communities as well.

The motion the village negotiate for the park land was moved by Therin Ellis and seconded by Bernard Shea.

STRONG COMPLAINTS — Strong complaints were voiced at the meeting over unsightly conditions along highways, a road only in O'Leary but elsewhere, caused by old car bodies and other junk and abandoned buildings.

A resolution was passed to draw the attention of the appropriate minister of government to conditions, with a request for a prompt cleanup.

## FLQ Hearings To Start Today

MONTREAL (CP) — Preliminary hearings are to start today for 17 men and one woman facing a total of 154 charges in connection with the terrorist activities of the Front de Liberation Quebecois.

The charges range from non-capital murder — laid against five of those under arrest — conspiracy to cause an explosion. Sentences on conviction of the charges could range from five years to life.

Facing the murder charges are Georges Schecters, 33, Belgian-born economics student; Gabriel Hinton, 30, industrial designer; Raymond Villeneuve, 19, student; Jacques Groux, 19, student; and Yves Labonte, 18, clerk.

The preliminary hearings, at which a judge will decide whether the accused should be committed for trial, may last several weeks.
