"DISMISS THE GOVERNMENT."

UNDER this heading the Montreal Star comments upon the government's refusal to order a judicial investigation into the Yukon charges and says:

"Three Liberal members, Mr. Oliver, Mr. Richardson and Mr. McInnis, all three representatives of western constituencies which are particularly interested in the honest administration of the Department of the Interior, voted against this disgrace to their party, to the Government and to the country.

"The vote means that the Government of Canada stands at the back of the horde of official scoundrels who are looting the gold country.

"The chief infamy is not that the Yukon, according to Sir Hibbert's charges, has fallen into the hands of thieves, prostitutes and black-mailers; but that the Government of the Dominion of Canada is afraid to stand its trial for connivance in this alleged reign of corruption.

"The ministers are full of valour; nothing hurts them so much as to be called the cowards that they are; but they would rather be branded as corrupt Government, than they would take the risks involved in uncovering that mass of corruption up in the Yukon country.

"It is enough to make an honest Liberal blush for his vote, choose the back lanes rather than the main streets for his walks, and to come out with the owls and the bats rather than with the lark.

"Oh! The shame and the disgrace for Canada, that widespread and specific charges of corruption are made upon the floor of Parliament against a branch of the public service, and the Government of Canada has to confess before all the world that it dare not face those charges, even before a court of its own choosing.

"There never was a case which called so emphatically for the intervention of His Excellency the Governor General. Ministers with so little regard for their own honor are not fit advisers for the Queen's representative. His Excellency would be abundantly justified in insisting upon a prompt and thorough judicial investigation of Sir Hibbert Tupper's charges, and if the Government will not consent to this, he should dismiss the Government.

"The Governor will find an excellent precedent in the dismissal of the Mercer Government by Lieutenant Governor Angers. The corruption alleged and subsequently proved against the Mercer Administration was not a whit more flagrant than that now alleged against the Yukon administration. Lieut. Governor Angers' course was triumphantly vindicated in the general election which followed, and we are convinced that the people of Canada would as promptly express their approval of similar action by Lord Minto. The retention in office of Ministers who are too cowardly to execute justice brings dishonor upon the Throne as well as humiliation upon the people."

"The Star's feeling in this matter is reciprocated throughout the length and breadth of Canada.

Mr. Sifton's long speeches in Parliament go for nothing in view of the fact that after challenging Sir Charles Hibbert to formulate his charges definitely, the Government has backed out of the promised enquiry.

—An election to fill the vacant seat for the first electoral district of Prince County will be held on the 25th inst. This is the report and we believe the report true, though it cannot be officially verified.

Steel Stock.

MONTREAL, July 1.—It now transpires that three Canadian banks: The bank of Montreal, bank of Commerce and the Merchants bank of Halifax, will underwrite the whole of the Dominion Steel company's stock issue and that the general allotment will be made from these institutions.

The appointment of Rev. Walter Patton, D. D. of Montreal, to the professorship of Biblical literature at Yale University, is announced.

COLD STORAGE STEAMERS.

Our correspondent "Wide Awake" wants information about a subject that is engaging the attention of all who are interested in the prosperity of this Province? The spring is past, and its opportunities are gone forever. The summer is here, but no steamer to go direct to British ports; has put in an appearance and no intimation has been given that one will be forth coming in the near future. We have heard that Sir Louis Davies pleads that he can't find a steamer willing to come here for the subsidy offered by the government. In view of the success of the steamers which sailed from here last year this plea seems unreasonable. It is true that freights are up. But even so, the Government of Canada ought to be able to induce a steamer to come to Prince Edward Island as a set off to the many subsidized vessels leaving ports the coast of the mainland. There is an old saying that "where there's a will there's a way," and we incline to the opinion that it fits the government in respect to this matter of steam communication between Prince Edward Island and Great Britain.

THE ASYLUM SCANDAL

A proper and satisfactory investigation of the scandalous matter developed under the Liberal Government's management of the Hospital for the Insane would include not merely an examination of the chief officers of the institution. The attendants, the contractors involved—by the way, who are they?—those who have charge of the heating apparatus, every sane person about the premises, ought to be called and examined under oath. We protest against the one-sided white-washing kind of enquiry made a few days ago. But, we shall not ignore testimony pertinent to the case. The evidence of Dr. Blanchard, copied from the Patriot—to which the reporter's manuscript has been given,—will be found in another column. It confirms fully the statement that the food supplied the patients was unclean in the sense suggested by THE EXAMINER's correspondent and that the temperature of the guarded rooms was "freezing."

The name of "Mary Jane McInnis" has been drawn into the case. A written statement made by her was it appears read to the Grand Jury. We presume that the written statement was, originally, made to the government and that it contained charges similar to those published by THE EXAMINER which have been proved. It would be interesting to know whether Mary Jane McInnis was the dismissed attendant to whom The Patriot referred, and whether her dismissal was on account of the "written statement." It Miss McInnis called the attention of the authorities to the unclean food supplied to the Government's wards, and if she were dismissed therefor,—it is evident that she has suffered a wrong that ought to be righted.

A Challenge.

MONTREAL, July 1.—Lawrence J. Wilson, a prominent Montreal Liberal and friend of Judge Dugas, says he will challenge Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper to prove his charges against the judge, and that if Sir Hibbert can prove that the judge has been guilty of any illegal act, he (Wilson) will forfeit \$5,000.

Two rival companies are competing for the railways of Cuba; and big money is offered for possession of the rail lines.

All parties agree that Sir Richard is making a strong case for Great Britain before the Venezuelan boundary commission.

It has been officially announced that the Duke of Albany, son of Prince Leopold, will succeed to the Dukedom of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha.

Iron Away Up

NEW YORK, July 1.—R. G. Dnn and Company say: The demand for iron and steel seems to have no limit. Prices of pig average higher than at any other time since February, 1890, and prices of finished products higher than since March, 1891. Billets are hardly obtainable, bar and plate orders are rushed quite largely because the works are over-crowded, steel mills have much stronger demand at the west, but less at the east and structural works report 26,000 required in two east ere contracts. Tin is stronger at 26 cents and copper at 18 cents for lake, but lead is dull with hope of an end to the Colorado strike.

A laborers strike is on at the Chicago stock yards.

William Noseworthy fell fifty feet at Halifax on Friday and still lives.

The Liberal Conservatives of Manitoba will meet in Convention on the 10th of July.

There has been rioting at Brussels. A hundred persons were wounded—eight seriously.

The Clyde ship building returns for the half year just ending beat all previous records. They show that 125 vessels were launched, representing an aggregate tonnage of 234,877. No fresh orders were placed this month, but there is six months' work at full time on hand.
