POTATO MEETING
Those who came to the Monday night potato meeting in Charlottetown expecting to see a fight or threshing of old straw were probably disappointed. Those who came, and they were certainly the great majority, with a sincere interest in starting something which would benefit the potato industry and the province were probably not disappointed. The meeting was characterized by good order and a high degree of reason that always has not been typical of potato meetings in this province.

The committee which was appointed last fall at the County Federation meetings has earned the confidence of the potato growers, its report was accepted almost unanimously by the meeting and the committee paid the compliment of being named to act as a nominating and organization committee for the new potato association. The nominating committee has a heavy responsibility but have already given evidence of their ability to consider things in an objective way and to make decisions that are sound.

The aim in the potato industry should be to build an organization on a sound foundation, to build it slowly and carefully and to cultivate the good will of all the different sections which are necessary if promotion and development are to follow sound lines.

From the meeting a number of things seemed to stand out clearly. 1. That the new organization was expected to be one for the growers. 2. That there would probably be willingness to finance the organization through some form of levy or deduction. 3. That a good man should be found to fill the executive position and he probably wouldn't be a cheap one. **EARLY BIRD**

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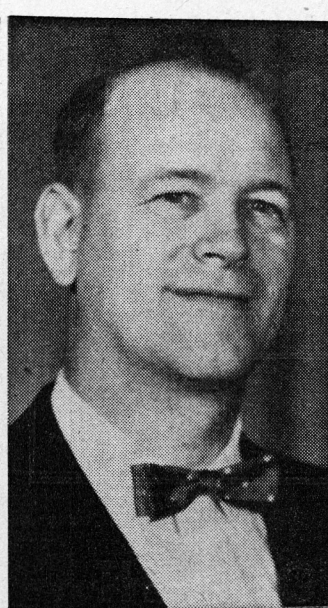

Health insurance will increase work," Dr. Jelks said, "and the volume and scope of the Public Health laboratory will widen rapidly."

He concluded that virus diseases, fungus diseases and copulating after effects of several theraps will provide further problems for the various divisions of the Laboratories connected with Public Health in lab staff, he said that "automata the provinces. "Laboratories now investigate all conditions relative to the several divisions of the Public Health Department," Dr. F. W. Bethlehem Steel Pays Dividend
NEW YORK (AP)—Bethlehem Steel Corp. Thursday declared a dividend of 60 cents a share, the same amount it has been paying quarterly.

The dividend will be paid June 2 to stockholders of record May 3.

Net income for the first quarter totalled \$4,819,490, equal to 52 cents a share compared with \$53,427,644 or \$1.24 a share in the first quarter last year.

Directors also declared a dividend of \$1.75 a share on the seven-per-cent cumulative preferred stock, payable July 1 to stockholders of record June 2.
