## Eisenhower Campaigns For New US Labor Laws

### Former President Truman Bangs At Economic Issue

NEW YORK (AP) — President Eisenhower campaigned Tuesday for new labor laws to eliminate corruption among union leaders. Former president Truman, banging away at the economic issue, said the recession is not over and won't be as long as the Republicans are running the U.S. The two spoke at opposite ends of the U.S. in their bid for votes in the congressional elections Nov. 4.

Eisenhower addressing Republican workers in San Francisco, accused the Democrats of scuttling his efforts to fight trade union corruption and of fostering a dangerous drift toward bureaucratic government. Truman appeared at a Democratic rally in New Castle, Pa. "We have had five years of Republican neglect and abuse of the working people," he said.

When he asked, "do you approve of our firm stand in foreign policy?" There were cheers from the crowd and many released yellow balloons bearing Republican slogans. In New Castle, Truman said that unless he is badly mistaken the election will bring "the biggest Democratic landslide since Franklin Roosevelt drove the money changers out of the temple in 1932."

### Confer As Gun Duels Continue

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—State Secretary Dulles and President Chiang Kai-shek headed into new talks today while fresh artillery duels blazed in Formosa Strait.

Today's conferences followed three meetings between Dulles and Chiang Tuesday, the day Dulles arrived on his Formosa mission.

Nationalist defence spokesmen said the Chinese Communists fired 6,626 shells at the Quemoy in the 12 hours ending at 6 a.m. today. The Nationalists fired back, using 8-inch howitzers and other guns moved to the island outposts during the cease-fire the Reds broke Monday.

Following Tuesday's talks between Dulles and Chiang, a spokesman said the whole political and military situation in the Formosa area was reviewed. In reply to a question, he said it was possible the two discussed possible resumption of U.S. warship convoys for supply ships to Quemoy.

### Hospital Insurance Cost To Be High, Says Minister

Commenting on a statement made by Hon. J.W. Monteith, Federal Minister of Health and Welfare, when he referred to Hospital Insurance in an address to the Charlottetown Rotary Club this week, Hon. A. A. MacIsaac, Provincial Minister of Welfare and Labor, had the following to say: "I completely agree with Mr. Monteith's statement that a great deal of time is needed for the implementation of a proper Hospital Insurance plan. His advice to take as much time as possible for a thorough study of all aspects of the proposed scheme before putting it into effect should definitely be followed."

"This is particularly true in the case of Prince Edward Island. Here we have achieved an enviable record in the matter of adequate hospital facilities. Our hospitals are among the finest in Canada and our medical services are as good as any. In any new plan, we must take every precaution to guard against deterioration of our present satisfactory services and insure that any alternate arrangement is superior."

ONE OF FIRST  
"Prince Edward Island was one of the first of the provinces to join Canada's Hospital Insurance plan. When the federal scheme needed a sixth province before it could be instituted, we announced our intention to institute such a program thus making it possible on a national basis. Now it is up to us to make sure our people get the greatest possible benefit from this Federal-Provincial arrangement."

"There is, however, one aspect of this whole matter which may be misunderstood. There seems to be an impression abroad that Hospital Insurance is free or that it will cost very little. This is far from being true. The cost of financing a Hospital Insurance plan of this type will be quite high. For instance, in Nova Scotia it is estimated it will cost approximately \$5,500,000 annually. Estimates of the cost in New Brunswick run in the vicinity of \$50 per family per year and it is under-

### TO BE COSTLY

"Here in Prince Edward Island the expense of operating a Hospital Insurance plan may well be higher than in most provinces. Such may be expected in a predominantly rural province where many segments of our population are far removed from hospitals and near-by medical attention. Patients living far from doctors must often be brought to hospital for treatment and this in particular in winter months due to the uncertainty of roads and weather. In addition, the basic per capita cost would be higher because of our limited population."

ARGENTINA, Nfld. (CP)—Naval divers here have begun the grim task of removing bodies from the submerged wreckage of a United States Navy Super Constellation. A spokesman said Tuesday night five bodies have been recovered from the fuselage. It was not known if others were inside. One serviceman drowned Saturday shortly after the plane crashed in the water about 1,000 feet short of the runway. Ten others, including a civilian Red Cross worker, were believed caught in the wreckage.

Eighteen others escaped by clinging to a life raft until picked up by surface vessels. They were treated for shock, exposure and minor injuries.

### Wounded Cop Dies, Leaves Behind Mystery

NEW YORK (AP) — Patrolman James McDermott died of bullet wounds Tuesday, leaving behind the mystery of why he shot four men to death in a Broadway bar.

McDermott, 34-year-old veteran of 10 years on the force with a good record, walked into the Pic-a-Rib restaurant early Sunday and shot down the four men without a word. One was believed to be a stranger to him. The berserk cop was mowed down by police bullets and had been in critical condition in hospital. He did not regain consciousness long enough to be questioned about his motive for the slayings.

### Conviction Grows New Pope Will Be Elderly, Conservative Italian

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Conviction is growing in Rome that the next pope will come from the ranks of the elderly, conservative Italian members of the college of cardinals.

Almost all the members of the college now are here or nearby, and they are in a position to exchange ideas before they begin voting Saturday on a successor to Pius XII.

More and more, talk is heard among qualified observers of a "transition pope." Such a man would continue the policies of Pius XII but would be unlikely to introduce any startling precedents.

Most over 70  
Fifty-two of the church's 54 princes probably will be taking part in the conclave. Their combined age totals 3,795 years and their average age is 73. Most are over 70, and in this conclave youth—relative youth—may work against a candidate.

Youth could react against the choice of the man some believe Pius XII had favored as his successor. Only 52, Giuseppe Cardinal Siri, Archbishop of Genoa, would have a long reign as pontiff. But in comparison with the other cardinals, he could hardly be considered conservative.

The age of the man finally chosen, say many observers here, likely will be between 65 and 75. Among Italian cardinals in this category are Giacomo Lercaro, 66, Archbishop of Bologna; Alfredo Ottaviani, 67, pro-secretary of the consistorial congregation; Ernesto Ruffini, 70, Archbishop of Palermo; and Valerio Valeri, prefect of the congregation for the religious orders.

A vote of 36 — two-thirds of those expected to vote plus one—will determine who will be the next pope.

### DRAW FOR ROOMS

In preparation, 41 of the cardinals drew lots for the three-room apartment they will occupy within the closed quadrangle near the Sixtine Chapel.

### Citizenship Minister Backs Middleman In Prices Probe

BOSTON (CP) — Citizenship Minister Fairclough of Canada Tuesday stood by the middleman in the retail industry controversy over price spreads.

She told the Boston Conference on Distribution that criticism of the middleman — wholesaler or distributor — over the spread in price between that received by the producer and that paid by the consumer seldom takes everything into account.

"From time to time, particularly when retail prices are rising sharply, the distribution system comes under heavy criticism. Protests are frequently made to the effect that distribution costs are out of proportion to the services performed."

"Such criticism seldom takes into account the complexity of the distribution system and the variation in costs that arise from the differing nature of products that flow through the system," she said.

### HONORED BY CONFERENCE

The famed international forum, holding its 30th conference here, Monday nominated Mrs. Fairclough to its hall of fame.

Mrs. Fairclough in her address noted an increasing trend toward integration of marketing institutions in Canada, with both larger retailers and producers assuming more and more marketing functions. The result was a decline in the relative importance of the independent retailer and wholesaler.

### Urges Road Policy Plans Be Revealed

MONCTON (CP) — The president of the Canadian Construction Association, Harold J. Ball of Kitchener, Ont., Tuesday called for an early announcement of federal government road — building policy to enable provinces and contractors to plan their work.

Mr. Ball, starting a four-day visit to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, told the Moncton Construction Association the federal government's roads-to-resources program is welcomed by the CCA.

He suggested a federal-provincial road program based on federal grants for improvement of Canada's main highway network; an auxiliary joint program for international connections, access roads, park approaches and the elimination of railway crossings.

### Duplessis Says Rumor 'Malicious'
