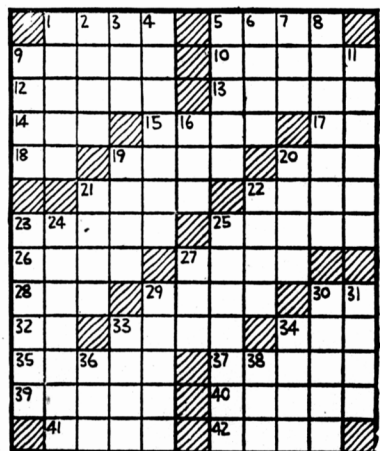

The white Bluebird chuckled. "I ought to know," said he. "I've been treated the same way. I guess you have forgotten that I look different from any of my family."

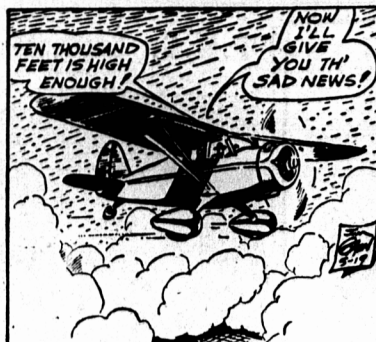

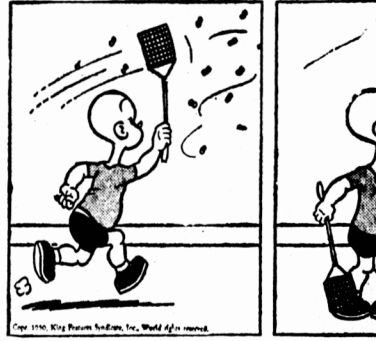

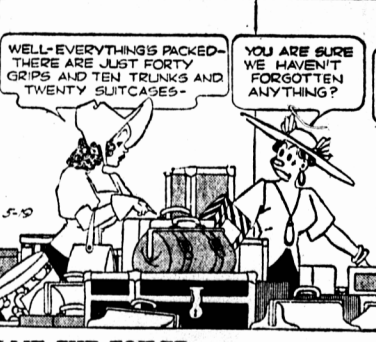
