ESCAPED FROM JAIL.—On Thursday night a man named Alex. Chisholm was arrested at Springhill, N. S., for selling liquor, but failing to give bonds, was locked up until Friday morning, when a trial was to have taken place. Some time during the night the lock of the outer door of the jail was picked, the inside lock smashed with a bar, and Chisholm set at liberty.

SCOTT ACT.—At Souris yesterday, before Magistrate Blandford, Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Captain A. H. Macdonald, Angus McCormack, Captain J. D. Lavin, and Ephraim McKenzie, of Souris, and Daniel Nowlan, of Chepstow, were each fined in the sum of \$50 and costs, or two months imprisonment for violating the Scott Act. The summons against Alexander Macdonald was dismissed for want of evidence.

DON'T FAIL TO ATTEND.—The Rev. G. M. Campbell will deliver a lecture in the Upper Methodist Church, on Tuesday evening next, November 13th, at 8 o'clock. His subject will be "The White City, or a Trip to the World's Fair." Admission—ladies, 10 cents; gentlemen, 15 cents. Proceeds for church purposes. As this will be the last time Rev. Mr. Campbell will deliver this lecture in Charlottetown, everyone should make a point of attending. A rare treat is in store for those who will be present on Tuesday night.

WOMAN'S LATEST VICTORY.—It has just been decided that the wife is entitled to own all the wedding presents, including the suspenders, collar buttons and neckties, providing she can prove she was the drawing card at the marriage ceremony. This is the latest victory for the end-of-the-century woman. This important ruling was made by Justice Underwood, of Chicago, as he gave over a pile of presents that completely covered the bar of justice and formed a fortress between him and the two persons who quarrelled over the accumulations of ten years. It was the case of Philip Ashall vs. Louise Anhalt. The presents were valued at \$1,000 and the woman got them all.

THE STORM UP WEST.—A correspondent of the Pioneer writes: Another cyclone equal in force, if not in extent, to the one of 1892, passed through from West Point in a northeast direction to Lot 6, carrying destruction in its path. Crossing the Hamilton Road, it moved the new house of Mr. McPherson six feet off its foundation, and levelled trees and fences for about a hundred yards wide to the O'Leary Road, half a mile from the station. The large new barn of Mr. Donald McDonald was destroyed, and two fine horses and four cows buried in the debris. With the assistance of kind neighbors, and after four hours' hard work in wind and rain, Mr. McDonald rescued these animals, but it is doubtful if the horses will recover, as they were much bruised, having been pressed down to a space of only twenty inches with five tons of hay and a quantity of straw on top of them. Mr. McDonald's loss will be about \$500, as all his season's crop, farming implements, &c., were partially destroyed. Mr. L. J. Shaw, on the north side of the road, had also his new house badly twisted and moved about eighteen inches. The storm did considerable damage on the Howland Road, blowing down one barn, unroofing another, besides leveling fences, with other minor casualties.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

London, Nov. 6.—A despatch to the Times from Tien Tsin, which will be published to-morrow, says that the representatives of all the powers were assembled on Saturday last, by the Tsung Li Yamen to hear the Chinese government's statement respecting the critical situation of affairs. Prince Tung, president of the Tung Li Yamen, the despatch adds, calmly avowed the inability of China to withstand the Japanese attack, and appealed to the powers to intervene, saying that China was willing to abandon her suzerainty over Corea and to pay a war indemnity. The ministers appreciated the frankness of this confession and promised to support Chinese appeal to their respective governments with a view to the restoration of peace and in order to avoid dangers threatening all interested. The French minister believed in taking a leading part in the proposed intervention.

Yalta, Nov. 6.—Five transports have arrived here with 3,000 troops, which, with strong forces of cavalry and artillery, will take part in the operations here attending the embarkation of the remains of the late Czar for Sebastopol. The spectacle as the transports entered the bay, with the flashing search-lights illuminating everything around was a most beautiful one.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Prince Cantacuzene, the Russian minister, notified the state department to-day that memorial exercises to the late Czar would be held at the Russian legation at 10 o'clock on Friday morning. Invitations have been sent to President Cleveland, members of the cabinet and other high officials.
