WASHINGTON DEEPLY WORRIED OVER SPLIT WITH OLD ALLIES

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration is beginning a major policy review from which may emerge a recommendation for a new program of dollar aid to allies in Western Europe. High United States officials are deeply worried both by the split with Britain and France following the Egyptian crisis and by the impact on their economies of the closing of the Suez Canal and the loss of Middle Eastern oil.
Some authorities believe the U.S. may be confronted with the need to develop a new program in the pattern of the Marshall Plan to foster the unity and strengthen the economic base of the North Atlantic Alliance. None contemplates now any such spending for European aid as the \$4,000,000,000 a year which the Marshall Plan cost.
Vice-President Nixon may have had the possibility of some new program in mind when, in a New York speech Thursday night, he referred to Britain's financial troubles and declared: "I believe it is in our interest as well as theirs to assist them in this hour of difficulty, and I am confident that there will be strong bipartisan support in the Congress for granting such assistance." SEE TROUBLE AHEAD
While Nixon did not say so, a recommendation for such aid would be certain to encounter strong opposition in Congress, which has been increasingly reluctant to vote purely economic aid to Europe.
At Augusta, Ga., where President Eisenhower is on vacation his press secretary, James C. Hagerty, said Eisenhower had not seen Nixon's speech in advance, but "the vice-president knows the policies of the president."
The current policy review, however, covers a wider field than the possibilities of bearing a greater share of the cost of free-world defenses and of liberalized trade with such countries as Britain and France. It includes also the concept of a more sympathetic U.S. attitude toward allied actions not in line with American desires, as in the case of the French-British intervention in Egypt.
