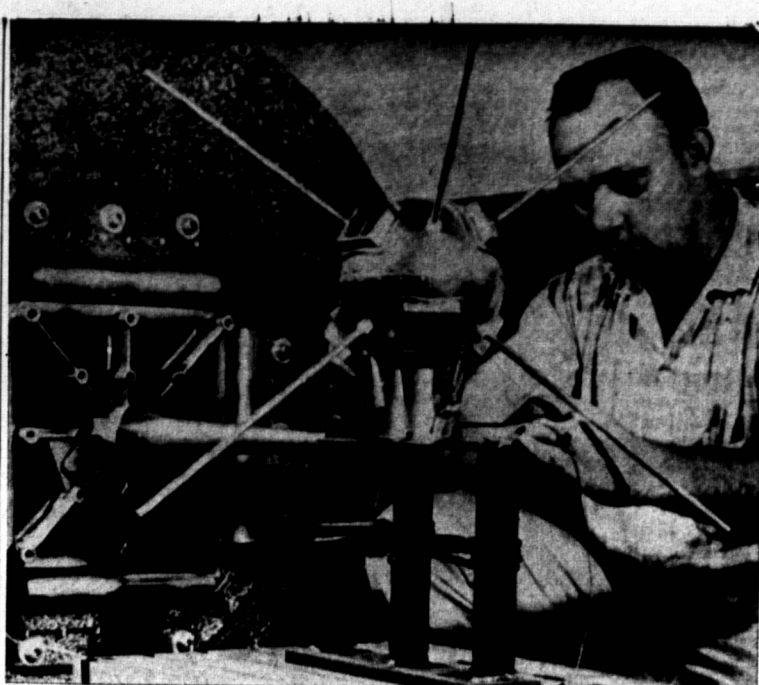

TEST SATELLITE

WASHINGTON—Wayne Traylor readies for vibration tests at the Naval Research Laboratory a 6-inch aluminum satellite similar to one scheduled for launch-

ing later this year as part of the test program prior to International Geophysical Year launching of a larger 20-inch satellite. The small sphere will contain miniature radio transmitters for tracking. Attached to its surface are six rectangular housings for solar batteries, to be evaluated as a possible power supply for later satellites.

Carleton Siding Farmer Is Killed In Accident

Mr. Albert Craswell, 37, of Carleton Siding was killed instantly in a farm-tractor accident, about one-quarter mile from his home yesterday afternoon around 4:00 o'clock.

The accident was first noticed by two young boys playing along the railroad track, who notified Mr. Boyd Lowther, the nearest neighbor, who immediately summoned Dr. R.L. Smith and the Borden detachment R.C.M.P. Dr. W.E. Callaghan, coroner, was also called to the scene and decided no inquest will be held. The late Mr. Craswell is survived by his wife, the former Beryl Johnson of Peters Road, and one son, David in his second year; also by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Craswell and two brothers, John and Wendell, all of Hunter River.

Prince Philip Reported At Odds With Palace Courtiers

LONDON (AP)—Prince Philip is reported at odds with Buckingham Palace courtiers who want him to get out of his old pal, Lt. Cmdr. Michael Parker. The Daily Herald, Labor party organ, says a big row is brewing behind the scenes between Prince Philip and the royal advisers who think it unwise for him to associate with his former private secretary, who resigned in a blaze of publicity last February after separating from his wife. Since then he and Prince Philip have kept up a friendship that dates back to their school days.

Herald columnist Henry Fielding, quoting "people close to Philip," says he has openly snubbed the all-powerful tweedy set by hobnobbing with Parker during last week's royal regatta at Cowes. "Philip's answer... has been to invite Mike aboard the royal yacht, to be seen having many a pint with him," Fielding writes. "BIGGEST SNUB" "And, biggest snub of all," he let Mike look after the young Prince Charles and take him for picnics. "The lords and ladies and high-ranking brasshats are hopping mad that Mike Parker, with no official position, was given sole charge of the heir to the throne while the Queen was 500 miles away in Scotland." Prince Philip also has come in for criticism from some newspapers for taking Prince Charles out in a sail boat in rough weather at Cowes. Fielding says the husband of the Queen has made it clear he is going to choose his own friends. "He has said so in blistering language."
