The Dow Jones Industrial average, which had been up as much as 1.81 at midday, ended with a net loss of 2.58 at 891.79. Analysts linked the rise of the golds and the fall in other issues with doleful reports from abroad about Britain's economic squeeze and business downturn, as well as an exceptionally sharp fall in the London stock market. The Associated Press average of 40 stocks dipped 1.0 to 331.0. Standard and Poor's 500-stock index declined 2.0 to 86.79. As gold stocks found favor, American South African investment made an unusually large gain of 7 points to close at 74 1/4, a home-stake, ex-dividend, gained 8.
