ACSHL Votes To Abolish 10-Cents Head To Visitors

MONCTON (CP)—The Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League Sunday voted to abolish the 10-cent head subsidy which has been awarded visiting teams in the Amherst, Charlottetown and Fredericton rinks.

The move was brought about by an Amherst request to be excused from the arrangement because of financial difficulties. Moncton Hawks had been excused from paying, or collecting, the subsidy before the season started.

Jack Berny of Fredericton, first vice-president of the league, termed the move unwise because he felt the subsidy to visiting clubs has always been the salvation of any sports organization, and that such an arrangement usually is beneficial to all concerned in the long run.

Gene Litter Wins Golf Tournament

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Gene Litter of Palm Springs, Calif., won the top money in the \$32,500 Los Angeles open golf tournament Sunday with a final round 69 and a 72-hole score of 276.

The 1953 U.S. amateur champion cut the tough field down to size in winning the \$5,000 first prize. It was his first major triumph since he turned professional less than a year ago after whipping the pros in the San Diego open.

Coming with a rush in the final stages as the other challengers fell by the wayside, Ted Kroll of Bethesda, Md., took second place money of \$2,780 with a final round 69—his third straight 69—for 278.

MONTEAL (CP)—Boston Bruins and Montreal Canadiens sawed off to a 1-1 tie Saturday night in an unusually close-checking game in which the Bruins' proficiency at that style of play was a standout.

Jean Beliveau of Montreal and Leo Labine of Boston scored the only goals and were the best forwards on the ice. Beliveau's goal was his 21st of the National Hockey League season.

The game was scoreless from near the middle of the second period, although the Bruins almost broke it up in the dying minutes when Hal Laycoe went loose on a clear breakaway only to have goalie Jacques Plante make a sen-

sational save.

The split points cut the margin of the league-leading Canadiens to four points over Detroit Red Wings. The Bruins bettered their fourth-place spot.

Beliveau scored at 9:38 of the first period, finishing off a neat passing play with Bert Olmstead and Butch Bouchard. Labine counted at 12:08 of the second period while Montreal was a man short.

Between the second and third periods, Maurice (Rocket) Richard was presented with \$2,000 by the Canadiens management in recognition of the 400th goal of his NHL career, scored Dec. 18. Richard immediately announced he was turning the money over to two Montreal hospitals.

TORONTO (CP)—The third-place Toronto Maple Leafs scoring in every period, walloped the fifth-place New York Rangers 5-0 before 12,588 National Hockey League fans here Saturday night.

Leafs picked up the first victory in their last nine games and helped protect goalie Harry Lumley's fifth shutout of the 1954-55 campaign.
