Minister Inducted At O'Leary Charge

O'LEARY — Rev. Stanley E. McKillop, BA, BD, was inducted Friday evening as minister of O'Leary Pastoral Charge of the United Church.

The service, held in O'Leary Church, was conducted by Rev. C. R. Webber, DD, assisted by Rev. W. B. MacPhail who read the Scripture lesson and led in prayer. Rev. F. B. Stiles preached the sermon and gave the charge to the minister and people.

Dr. Webber inducted Mr. McKillop and other members of Presbytery extended the right hand of fellowship.

During the service a solo, "Untill Then," was sung by Carl Adams.

At the conclusion of the service there was a reception in the church centre. Members of the church were introduced to Mr. and Mrs. McKillop by the clerk of session, John Matthews. There was a hymn sing with Mrs. Lewis Bernard as pianist, after which Mr. Matthews called upon the clergymen present to speak briefly. Mr. McKillop spoke first and he was followed by Dr. Webber, Mr. MacPhail, Mr. Stiles and Rev. Grant Walls. Refreshments were served by the ladies of the charge which includes O'Leary, Bloomfield, Brae and West Devon.

Mr. McKillop, whose home is in Stewiacke, N.S., was ordained to the Christian ministry in June 1961 and since that time has served a charge in Saskatchewan.

Mr. and Mrs. McKillop have two small children, Heather and Michael.

Playground Attendance Totals 6,606

A total of 6,606 children attended activities at city playgrounds last week.

The playgrounds, which are open daily, except Sunday, are staffed by qualified instructors who are supervising a varied and interesting program of events and activities.

The continued fine weather saw such events as picnics and concerts high on the list, while the crafts division took on renewed enthusiasm with special projects being turned out by the youngsters.

Organ Recital Held At Tignish

TIGNISH — J. Henri Gaudet, BA, chartered member of the Tignish Arts Foundation, presented an organ recital on Sunday evening at the church of St. Simon and St. Jude.

Attached to the program was history of the Tignish organ dating back to the year 1882.

One of Canada's great organists and a native of Tignish Benoit Poirier, MA, composer, organist, and director, began his early training on the church organ. He was organist at Notre Dame de Montreal for 38 years.

Mr. Poirier was also director of the Montreal Conservatory of Music.

Mining Industry Boom Is Help For Bathurst

BATHURST, N.B. (CP)—The resurgence of the mining industry near this northern New Brunswick town, scheduled to assume city status Jan. 1, has borne a wave of prosperity.

But newly-elected Mayor Duncan Young says Bathurst will never become a "boom town—bust town" like some other centres across Canada.

He says the safeguard of the economy is the "caution and confidence" of the people toward the town's stability, maintained by long-established industries and businesses.

He says the base metal industry—now well over the \$200,000,000 mark in construction, underground and concentrator operations and planned projects after a serious relapse in the early 1950s—is a many-faceted boost to the economy.

People not steadily employed before now are steadily employed. This is naturally bringing more money into Bathurst, permitting people to afford a few of the luxuries.

One sign of the extra money, he says, lies in 1965 tax collections—the highest in history "because people could afford to pay."

The Bathurst population now is 4,494 and is expected to increase to about 15,000 after amalgamation with suburbs. Estimated population by 1975 is 25,000 or 30,000.

Town Executive Director E. J. Doucet says the 1965 budget is \$1,375,711, with the two high schools and four other schools serving more than 2,000 students taking a \$738,113 bite of the revenue.

As the economy grows, so Bathurst grows. The value of 1964 building permits within the town was \$2,261,000 in contrast to \$1,184,000 in outside areas. The emphasis is now on outside area construction because of limited town expansion.

Four By-Elections Are Due If No General Vote Held

OTTAWA (CP)—The voters will have a chance to pass judgment on the Pearson government this fall, even if the prime minister gives up the idea of calling a general election and the minority government survives expected tests of confidence in the Commons.

In the event of there being no general election, the vehicle for testing the government's standing with the electorate would come through byelections to fill four Commons vacancies.

Prime Minister Pearson has indicated he is in no rush to decide about byelections since Parliament isn't scheduled to meet until Sept. 27.

However, he has been a consistent advocate of not leaving Commons seats vacant for any length of time. There appears to be no compelling reason for him to make an exception in the cases of the current vacancies.

The vacancies cover two Ontario, one Quebec and one Nova Scotia seat. There's the possibility of another Nova Scotia vacancy if Halifax Liberal Gerald Regan quits.

HEADS N.S. LIBERALS
Mr. Regan has been elected leader of the provincial Liberals in his home province and has said he will wait until Parliament meets in September before deciding whether to resign from the Commons.

That's a circumspet way of saying that he will wait to find out whether it is convenient for the government to have a fifth Commons vacancy on its hands. It may not be convenient until the government sees how it withstands votes of confidence on such matters as the Dorian report.

The Liberals hold 127 Commons seats while the combined opposition totals 134—92 Progressive Conservatives, 18 New Democrats, 13 Creditistes, nine Social Credit and two independents.

The vacancies are in Digby-Annapolis, Kinross, formerly held by Conservative George Nowlan who died May 31; Montreal-Dollard where Liberal Guy Rouleau resigned effective July 31 in the wake of the Dorian report; Victoria, Ont., created by the July 12 death of Conservative Charles Lamb; and Kenora-Rainy River.

The latter seat became vacant automatically with the appointment of former mines minister William Bennidickson to the Senate July 7.

CITY REPORTS 11 ACCIDENTS

Eleven accidents, with total damage amounting to \$1,375, were reported to city police for the week ending July 29.

Damage in a hit and run incident on Queen Street about 2 a.m. July 23 was estimated at \$35. A car and motor scooter collided on the same day at the Upper Queen-Stewart Street intersection. The scooter received about \$25 damage and the car was undamaged.

A third accident July 23 occurred at the intersection of Queen and Kent Streets. Damage to the two cars involved was estimated at \$100.

A child was hospitalized for X-rays when struck by a car on Park Street July 24. The pedestrian was not seriously injured.

Approximately \$130 damage resulted from a two-car collision at the lower end of Sydney Street Sunday July 25, while \$100 damage was realized from a similar accident at the corner of Prince Street and Grafton Street the same day.

Two two-car collisions occurred Monday at the intersections of Malpeque Road-Belvedere Avenue and Brighton Road-Ambrose Street with damages estimated at a total of \$285.

A child was hospitalized with minor injuries when struck by a car on the evening of July 27 at the Spring Park Road - Chestnut Street intersection.

A two car collision at the intersection of Goodwill Avenue and Admiral Street Wednesday, July 28, resulted in approximately \$450 damage while a similar accident on the same day at the intersection of Euston Street and Prince Street at 5.30 p.m. resulted in about \$150 damages to the cars involved.
