The Japanese ports of Yokohama, Nagasaki and Hakodate were opened to foreign trade in 1858.



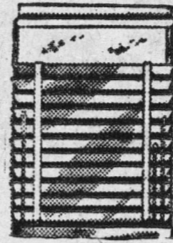
CHAMPION-CAMPBELL WEDDING
