Missing Steamships.

HALIFAX, June 1.

There is intense anxiety here this evening for the S. S. Siberian, now ten days out for St. John's, Nfld. It is thought that she must have met with disaster.

The S. S. Sardinian is also overdue at Rimonski.

The S. S. British Crown has arrived. She ran through eight hundred miles of thick, black fog. She brought eighty tons of powder, the largest quantity ever brought across the Atlantic on a merchant steamship.

The Halifax Chronicle publishes the following special from St. John's, Nfld., June 1. A schooner has arrived here, which passed a three-masted steamer off Cape Race on Wednesday. The steamer was firing rockets and blowing signals of distress, but the fog was so dense that the schooner could render no assistance. Icebergs were seen in every direction, and after the schooner had passed some distance to leeward of the steamer a terrible crash was heard, the whistle ceased to blow, and no more rockets were seen. No tidings have yet been received of the Siberian, and this may have been her.
