



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

At ten a.m. a week from Monday the 18th annual auction of the Standardbred Horse Sales Company will commence at the Pennsylvania State Farm show area, Harrisburg, Pa. and will continue until Friday afternoon. Upwards of 1,000 trotters and pacers are catalogued with thirty or more of them having records of 200 or better. Not only will there be trotters and pacers from many of the leading stables in the United States consigned but there will also be hundreds of yearlings from outstanding speed nurseries as Hanover Shoe Farms, Fairmaid Green Acres, Wilmington, Ohio, C. T. Black Farm, Virginia, S. A. Wathen and Sons, Fort Fairfield, Maine, Two Galts Farm, Indianapolis, Indiana, H. M. Lybrook, Clemmons, N.C., Grand View Farm, Newcastle, Indiana, Gray Bros. and Armstrong, East Providence, R. I., W. H. Hecht, Salina, Ohio, Glenn T. Riffe, Windfall, Indiana, Shady Dale Farm, Shady Dale, G.A. Hayes Acres Farm, Shady Dale Farm, California and many others.

There are a total of 933 horses of all ages catalogued with the largest consignment of Hanover Shoe Farms. We understand that a number of horsemen from the Maritimes are going down to the sale and will probably bring home some speed.

Cruikshank, Halifax; Grand Miss Volo, a yearling, George Jabalee, North Sydney; Czarina Volo, Clayton MacLeod, New Glasgow, N.S., Grand Haze, Agt. North Sydney, Dave Grattan, and G. Stables, Halifax; (Price \$6,500), Singing Sword, L. and G. Stables, Halifax; (Price \$6,000), Gay Spirit, Cyril Smith, Hunter River, P.E.I. (Price \$1,000), Queen Rodney, a yearling, Wild Mac Donald, Summerside; Glyn Jack, Roy Creamer, St. Stephen, N.B., Walter Rosecroft R.Y. Creamer, St. Stephen. This horse was sold for \$350 and was certainly a great buy. He was the winner of twelve dashes this season.

YEARLING
The total number of yearlings at the above sale was 413 and they brought \$1,240,950, or an average of \$3,004. The 16 sired by Hoot Mon 3, 2.00 averaged \$15,507 and the 17 by Bill Gallon 1, 1.59% averaged \$6,477. The 21 by Adios averaged \$6,518. The total for the 638 horses was \$1,132,848 which was a record. The top price was \$25,000 for the yearling trotting colt Juno Executive, own brother to Stenographer 3, 1.59 1/2 and Leonard J. Buck of the Allwood Stables was the purchaser.

Tied for second place in the bidding were a pair of Hoot Mon yearlings from the Hanover consignment each going for \$45,000 to the Sol Camp Stables, Shafters, Calif. Bond Hanover, own brother to Dutch Hawk 2, 2:02 1/4 was first secured by Joe O'Brien and a few minutes later O'Brien made the final bid of \$45,000 on Mudge Hanover, brother to this year's good colt Magnus Hanover 2:06-2-4. He also added the yearling pacer Adios Express to the Camp Stables paying \$25,000—He won \$25,000 this year.

The biggest day of the auction was Thursday when 196 head sold for \$628,750. Up until the past week harness horsemen and horse racing papers have been stating that this year's auction at Harrisburg would shatter all previous records for total purchases and might also establish a new high price for yearlings. Now no doubt a good many are changing their minds or becoming a bit more cautious in their expectations due to the recent very severe breaks in the stock markets and also the tightening money policy which is being enacted in the United States and Canada. If there is a decline in prices you can certainly attribute it to the above factors.

FREE-FOR-ALLER
For Maritimers who want a good free-for-aller Mack Primrose p. 1:59 4-5 (2, 2:05, 3, 2:01 1/2) should fill the bill. He is a 5-year-old chestnut horse by Peter Primrose p. 2:01 1/2 and his dam is Tronia Axworthy by Perk Axworthy 3, 2:09 1/2. He was bred by Sol Camp and is consigned by him to the Harrisburg sale. He started 25 times in 1956, winning 12 firsts and beating such horses as Frisco Creed 4, 1:58, Gold Worthy p. 1:58 3-5, El Hill p. 3, 1:59, etc. He won over half mile tracks in 2:02 1-5, 2:02 2-5, 2:02 3-5, etc. He won his last start at Lexington and was turned out; is sound and eligible to a 2:18 class. Another good horse from the same stable is Solicitor General p. 2, 2:03 2-5, full brother to Solicitor p. 3, 1:57 2-5. He was a winner at Roosevelt Raceway this year in 2:04 2-5 and took ill and had to be laid up but is sound now. He is eligible to the 2:18 class.

A really good buy at Harrisburg was the 3-year-old pacer Fleming Way 2:04 2-5 by King's Cecil Letcher, Springfield, Pa. Counsel 1:58, dam Jane Axel 1:59 1/4, that was knocked down in 800. He had been raced by Joe O'Brien in his record and his total winnings were \$4,000. In the Letcher stable this year he has won 17 or more firsts and numerous placings and took a half mile record of 2:08 2-5 at Charlottetown. He also bought the pacer Redwood 5, 2:02 2-5, winner of five firsts and other placings.

AAVC Censures Rowell For Not Consulting Committee

TORONTO (CP)—The Amateur Athletic Union of Canada Friday censured its national track and field committee chairman, Fred Rowell, for selecting two members of Canada's Olympic team without consulting his committee. The censure motion came during a general session of the 63rd annual AAU meeting. It was proposed by the convention's track and field committee, of which Rowell is also chairman.

The committee discussed Rowell's selection of the last two Olympic team members, high jumper Alice Whitty of Vancouver and walker Alex Oakley of St. John's, Nfld., in a stormy closed session Thursday.

An official protest was filed by the union's Newfoundland branch because George Hillier, St. John's marathoner, was kept off the team when he failed by one minute and five seconds to make the Olympic standard set by the AAU in a trial at Hamilton Sept. 29. Miss Whitty also failed to make

national chairman. "I felt that while it was desirable to consult the national committee, I did not have sufficient time to do so. I didn't feel that under the rules and regulations a national chairman was required to do so."

Chicago Players Say Benny Voit Sold To Canadiens

MONTREAL (CP) — Chicago players here for a National Hockey League game Saturday night said Friday that their teammate Benny Voit has been sold to Montreal Canadiens.

The players said the deal was made suddenly and they were not aware of all the details. It was understood that Voit, a 28-year-old defenceman, was placed on waivers and Canadiens claimed him for \$15,000. It was believed that he will be sent to Rochester of the American Hockey League, a Canadiens farm team.

Canadiens Thursday picked up Bronco Horvath on waivers from New York Rangers and assigned him to Rochester.

Meantime, Canadiens officials said Maurice (Rocket) Richard and Bernard (Boom-Boom) Geoffrion may have to undergo operations on injured elbows. Both are suffering from a condition similar to bursitis.

The operations said that if possible the officials will be arranged so that only one of the two injured players is missing from the lineup at a time.

Cyclist Says Investigation Has Declared Him An Amateur

WESTON, Ont. (CP) — Cyclist Pat Murphy told Friday a special inquiry ordered by the Canadian Olympic Association had declared him an amateur and "fully qualified to represent Canada at the Olympics."

He was answering charges made Thursday by Jack Scambler, president of the B.C. Cycling Association, at the annual convention of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada in Toronto.

Scambler accused Murphy of allowing his picture to be used in a bicycle firm's advertising and of taking part in three professional bike races.

Murphy said these same charges had already been brought to the attention of Ken Farmer, president of the Canadian Olympic Association.

"He asked George Crompton, chairman of the Dominion racing board of the Canadian Wheelmen's Association, to investigate. Crompton asked Eric Fellows, the district chairman of Ontario, to help and the two met with me early in October.

FULLY QUALIFIED
"They came up with the conclusion that I am an amateur and fully qualified to represent Canada at the Olympics."

Murphy, 23, is a sales clerk for Canadian Cycle and Motor Company here. He said the firm's advertising manager could support his denial that his picture had ever been used in advertising.

The professional races Scambler accused Murphy of participating in were listed as the Tour de St. Laurent and races in El Paso, Texas, in 1953 and in San Francisco in 1952.

Murphy said the Tour de St. Laurent was an amateur race. He said he had never been paid for any of the races.

Canada Has Hold On Show Trophy
NEW YORK (AP)—Canada has a stronghold on the low score competition challenge trophy and Ireland has come up with its first victory in the National Horse Show. That leaves Chile as the only country without a triumph in the international jumping competition at Madison Square Garden.

Going into Friday's finals of the low score competition, Canada has a low total of 16 faults. Chile is in second place with 29, Ireland third with 32, and the United States fourth with 48 and Mexico last with 107 1/2.

Douglas Cudney of Toronto kept Canada in front Thursday when he rode two mounts, Flash Gordon and Second Army, had a combined low aggregate of eight faults over the 16-jump course.

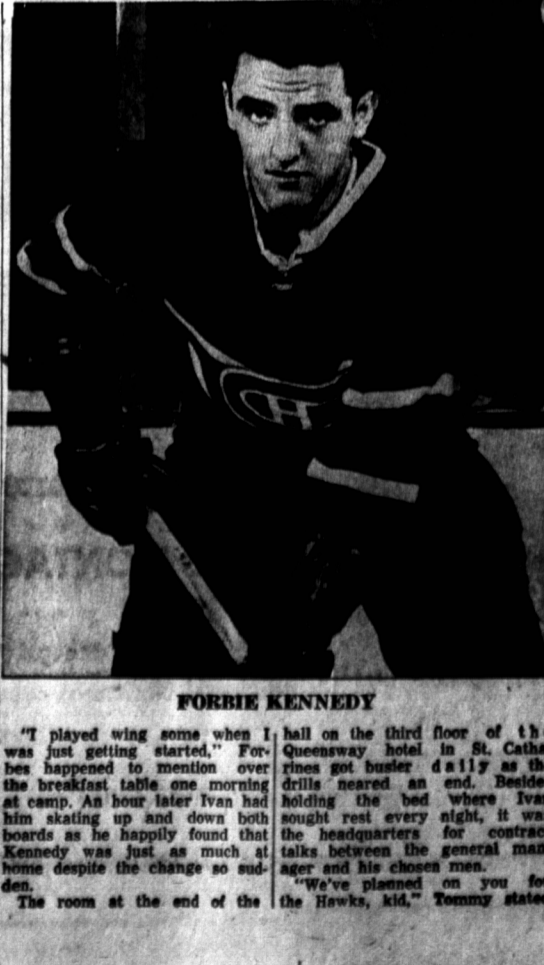
The flame flickered to life at the ancient sanctuary of the plains of Olympia, site of the first games, in Elis (Greece) and will not be extinguished until the final ceremony closes the 1956 Olympic Games next month.
