The New York Sun opines that the Senate has made a mistake in voting to admit eggs free of duty. It hears that Canadian hens are already working double time in anticipation of the opening of the U. S. markets.

The amount owing by the Peters Government to the Merchants Bank of P. E. Island had, on the 31st May, grown to \$74,615.00, while the sum loaned to the Provincial Government by the Merchants Bank of Halifax was \$116,250.00.

The Montreal Gazette points out that though there has been practically no addition to the paid up capital of the Canadian banks during the past eight years, which capital stands at \$62,112,000, nearly \$9,000,000 have been added to their respective reserves.

Closing of the City Schools

UPPER PRINCE STREET SCHOOL.

The closing exercises of this popular school were attended today by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, His Worship the Mayor, Hon. David Laird, Hon. T. H. Haviland, Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, Dr. Taylor, Mr. Ings, Mr. J. B. Macdonald, Mr. Blanchard, Mr. James, Mr. Duchemin, Mr. Miller, Mr. Stewart, Mr. McKinnon and so many others that the upper hall was greatly overcrowded.

After the oral examinations in the different rooms, of which the examiner's report most favorably, the following programme was well rendered:

The certificates of School Board for General Proficiency were distributed by J. B. Macdonald, Esq., who presided. The Lieutenant-Governor Howland complimented the school in the highest terms, in respect both to its general appearance and the conduct of the examinations which he had attended.

Hon. T. H. Haviland said that he had been Lieutenant-Governor and Mayor of the city. But of no position that he had ever occupied was he prouder than that of Patron of this beautiful School.

From what he had witnessed in the examinations, he felt sure that the School had greatly improved in the past year. He referred particularly to the scene from David Copperfield, enacted by girls in Miss Harris' Department; to the splendid recitations of the competitors in the Principal's Department for Dr. Taylor's prizes, and to the valedictory by Miss Small.

The composition and reading of the latter were, he said, excellent. He also called attention to the Prize Street School Times, which he hoped would be as great an influence upon the Board of Trustees as the London Times has upon the Government of Great Britain.

He learned from it that there were but two dictionaries in the school—and they private property, and that there was not in the school such a thing as a sofa upon which a scholar could sit in the event of illness or fainting.

The utter inadequacy of the hall for closing exercises, he said, so evident, that he hoped a larger room would be provided as soon as possible. He then turned to the recitation of the Government's policy, which the teachers of Charlottetown, those upon whom the education of the youth of the city depends. He trusted that this great mission would be carried out to the glory of the Prince Street School.

Hon. David Laird said that he had never defended the school in respect to the reduction of the salaries of the teachers of Charlottetown; nor would he do so now. He agreed with Hon. Mr. Howland that Prince Street School had never appeared at better advantage than today. He had been greatly pleased with the manner in which the different classes had performed.

He hoped that the School would be enlarged not towards heaven, as proposed, but towards earth. We will progress good westward.

Mr. T. C. James called attention to a fact which had been overlooked, viz., the historical prizes given by Mr. Haviland had never won—the 1st by Lizzie Anderson, of the Principal's Department, and the 2nd and 3rd by Lena White and Alma Robertson, of Miss Snaddon's Department. From the result of his examination of the pupils of Miss Harris' Department, he believed that they, too, would have done well if admitted to the competition.

He had frequently visited the school while ordinary class work was being done, and his personal observation led him to the conclusion that the teaching is very thorough.

Mr. McDonald announced that the holidays would extend to Monday, 3rd September. The children applauded and sang God Save the Queen.
