Charlottetown Milling Company's Baking Contest for Wives

The Charlottetown Milling Company will hold a baking contest for the housewives of Charlottetown, and are offering substantial cash prizes and a bag of flour for competition.

The contest will start right away, but all entries must be in not later than 10 a. m. on the morning of the 28th instant in the Market Building. The particulars of the Contest are as follows:—

Any housewife, woman or girl in the City may compete. All entries will be received at the Market Building on the morning of June 28th when judging will take place. Each competitor will be required to bring one loaf of bread baked from Gold Bond Flour, and be asked to sign a certificate to that effect, stating also from whom the flour was purchased.
