GENERAL BOTHA IN A TIGHT PLACE

DETAILS OF SURRENDER OF PRETORIA

The 13th Yeomanry Captured by the Boers—The Union Jack now Flying over Pretoria—Kruger has taken a lot of money—Botha will have to fight.

THE FORMAL ENTRY.

LONDON, June 6.—Lord Roberts telegraphs from Pretoria, June 5th: The occupation of the town passed off most satisfactorily.

The British flag is now hoisted on the top of the Government offices.

The troops met with a more enthusiastic reception than I anticipated.

The third battalion Grenadier Guards lined the square when the march past took place.

Owing to their having been out some distance around the town very few cavalry and infantry were able to take part in the ceremony.

Several of our officers who have been prisoners were among the onlookers.

SURRENDER OF PRETORIA.

LONDON, June 6.—The War Office has received the following from Lord Roberts:

PRETORIA, June 5.—Just before dark yesterday the enemy were beaten back from nearly all the positions they had been holding and General Hamilton's Mounted

Infantry followed them to within 2000 of Pretoria, through which they hastily retreated.

General Deslile then sent one officer, with a flag of truce, into the town, demanding its surrender in my name.

Shortly before midnight I was awakened by two officials of the South African Republic who brought me a letter from General Botha, proposing an armistice for the purpose of settling terms of surrender.

I replied that I would gladly meet the commandant next morning, but that I was not prepared to discuss any terms, as the surrender of the town must be unconditional.

I asked for a reply by daybreak, as I ordered the troops to march on the town as soon as it was light.

In his reply, General Botha told me that he had decided not to defend Pretoria, and that he trusted the women, children and property would be protected.

At 1 a. m. today, while on the line of march, I was met by three of the principal

officials with a flag of truce, stating their wish to surrender the town.

It was arranged that Pretoria should be taken possession of by Her Majesty's troops at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Mrs. Botha and Mrs. Kruger are behind Pretoria.

Some few of the British prisoners have been taken away, but the majority are still at Waterval.

Over a hundred officers are in Pretoria. The few I have seen are looking well.

KRUGER'S LAST BIG "HAUL."

LONDON, June 6.—General Botha and most of his men got away from Pretoria. This is inferred from Lord Roberts message. But the presumption is that the Boer Commandant General cannot escape the British dispositions without a fight.

Operations elsewhere seem to have dwindled to nothing.

General Baden-Powell joined General Hunter on Sunday at Lichtenburg. General Buller has not moved.

Bennet Barleigh, wiring from Johannesburg, says:

"President Kruger took £2,000,000 in cash to Middleburg."

IMPERIAL YEOMANRY CAPTURED.

LONDON, June 6.—Lord Roberts reports: PRETORIA STATION, June 5.—I regret to report that the 13th Imperial Yeomanry had to surrender to a very superior force of the enemy, May 31st, near Lindley.

On receiving information of the battalion being attacked I ordered Lord Methuen to proceed with all speed to its assistance.

Methuen was then on march on the Heilbron side of Kroonstadt and had, an hour after receipt of my telegram, June 1st, started off. By ten of the following day he had marched 44 miles in 25 hours. But he was too late to rescue Colonel Sprague's Yeomanry.

Lord Methuen attacked the Boers who were between two and three thousand strong, and after a running fight of five hours completely routed the enemy.

It is a very regrettable circumstance, but it will not be very long before the Imperial Yeomanry are released from captivity.

CANADIAN CASUALTIES.

LONDON, June 6.—The casualties of the British in the fighting under General Warren at Faberspruit, May 29, when with 700 men he was surrounded and attacked by one thousand colonial rebels who were repulsed, include one man killed and ten wounded among the Canadian artillery.

THE QUEEN'S TOAST.

LONDON, June 6.—Queen Victoria surrounded by the Duke and Duchess of York, Princess Christian, Princess Victoria and many of the notables of her court, drank to the health of Lord Roberts and the army at Balmoral last night.

A great bon-fire, lighted at Her Majesty's command, blazed on Craig-Gowan mountain, illuminating the country for miles around. The nation joins in the toast glorifying Lord Roberts and triumphantly rejoicing in his victory.
