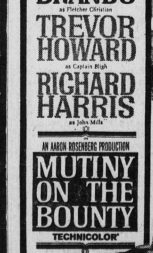

Accused To Be Treated At Riverside

A Charlottetown man, Earl Christopher, appearing in city police court Saturday on the complaint of his mother, was sentenced to 30 days in jail on a drunk and disorderly charge.

In passing sentence, Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC, instructed that arrangements be made to have the accused treated at Riverside Hospital. The court remanded William Doyle of Summersville to August 4, when he pleaded not guilty to having care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired.

Alfred Peters and Francis D. MacIntyre, both of Charlottetown, were fined \$10 and costs or five days and \$11 and costs or five days on speeding charges.

A man charged with possession of liquor not authorized by the Liquor Control Act was fined \$30 and costs or 40 days. Another accused was fined \$20 and costs.

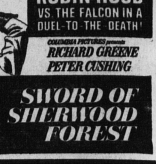
