Had they allowed a License Act to be passed, by which \$4,000 or \$5,000 might have been obtained for licenses, the rate would have been reduced to three quarters of one per cent. instead of being raised to one per cent. This would certainly be a great inducement to the Government to lease a portion of the farm, as the sea is encroaching more and more every year. Tribute To Rev. W. W. Brewer.

In a neat volume, published by the Centenary Methodist Church of St. John's on the occasion of its Jubilee, giving the early history of Methodism in that city; and of Centenary Church in particular, the following tribute is paid Rev. W. W. Brewer, a former pastor of Glad Tidings. "Mr. Brewer's public ministrations were marked by great earnestness and fervor, and as a messenger of Christ it was his endeavor to persuade men by gospel messages clearly and lovingly given. Under him an interesting and useful paper called Glad Tidings published and received with favor. In his term much evangelistic effort was put forth through what was known as Band Work, and so far as that work was directed in the Lower Provinces he was the superintendent. He was also deeply interested in the outcast and abandoned, many of whom received a great deal of care and attention at his hands. The extra work thus outlined, added to his circuit duties, represented an amount of labor that few men having respect for their health and strength would dare undertake."

Exports Decrease.

BERLIN, April 14.—The exports from Northern Germany to the United States for the first quarter of 1891 show a decrease of \$2,439,896 as compared with the same period of last year.

A Forger Wanted.

OTTAWA, April 14.—The Minister of Justice has made application to the United States Government for the arrest and extradition of James E. Hogan, who is supposed to be in Boston, and is wanted in Montreal for forgery.

The Australian Federation Idea.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., April 11.—The Australian Federation convention has resolved that the draft of the constitution which it has been considering be submitted to a popularly elected convention in each Australian colony, and that if three of these colonial conventions approve the constitution the imperial Government shall be asked to take steps for its establishment.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., April 13.—Charles J. Weir, assistant train master, Canada Southern Railway, this city, committed suicide this morning by shooting himself. He had been suffering from his usual duties during the night and returned to his home on Wellington street about 4 a. m., and committed the fatal act about thirty minutes later. Mr. Weir had only partially recovered from an attack of grippe, and to this his act is attributed.
