

News Items.

The news despatches now received, are the special property of the press of Charlottetown.

A destructive fire, by which much valuable property was destroyed, broke out in Fairbank's Factory, St. John, N. B., on the 6th inst.

Among the passengers to Halifax, by the City of Cork, was the Hon. Mr. Rogers, Bishop of Chatham, N. B. His Lordship is in the enjoyment of excellent health.

A sad accident, whereby three lives were lost, occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway, near Brighton, Ont., on Friday night, last week.

SOME worthless vagabond indulged his peculiar talent, on Saturday night last, by scaling Dr. Gaffney's door-post. It is a pity the thief could not be discovered and made an example for other evil-doers.

The condemned sch. Foam was bought at public auction by Mr. I. C. Hall, on Monday last, for \$200. The cargo of Foam was also offered for sale, but only \$500 having been offered, and the upset price put upon her being \$650, she was not sold.

Reports are again current that the young Prince Imperial of France is in a delicate state of health, being subject to fits of melancholy. Should he die, his father's cup of misery would be full.

Large surplus funds remain unused in the public treasury of Ontario. Governor Howland, in his speech, recommended the application of a portion to the development of the resources of the Province, by advancing commercial and agricultural interests, and subsidizing well-considered and bona fide railroad enterprises into the free grant districts and to the inland lakes.

A bear captured near Moncton, by yielding to the temptation of rum and molasses, placed in his way, was bought by the captain of a schooner, and taken to Windsor, N. S., where he was spilled out of a wagon, which broke his cage and afforded him a chance to escape. Rum and molasses again proved too tempting a bait. He was recaptured, and is now on exhibition in the Colonial Market, Halifax.

Mr. J. W. Falconer, has fitted up a hall on the third story of his establishment, on Queen Street, for Temperance and other societies. It is now occupied by the Metropolitan Lodge of British Templars. The room is large, and well lighted, amply provided with seats, and carpeted throughout its whole extent. The walls are hung with appropriate pictures. Adjoining this model hall, is a small reading room, which, we believe, a new feature in connection with the Temperance organization on this Island. We hope Mr. Falconer's enterprise may be crowned with abundant success.—Pit.

FOUND DROWNED.—The body of a man named Gordon Hill, blacksmith, belonging to Ragged Islands, was picked up at Black Bros. & Co's. Wharf this morning. The unfortunate man was seen last night between eight and nine o'clock under the influence of liquor, and it is supposed he whithered down on the wharf, fell over, and was drowned. In his pocket was found over \$200 in paper and silver. The body was taken to the Green Market, which is now made to do duty as a "Dead House." An inquest was held by Coroner Farrell this afternoon, in the office of Hon. W. Stairs, and a verdict of accidental death by drowning returned.—H. Reporter, Dec. 15.

SHOCKING SUICIDE.—The people in the usually quiet neighborhood of Sea Cow Head, were thrown into a state of excitement, learning that the daughter of Mr. James Sherry, farmer of that place, was found on Thursday night last, with her throat cut. Ann Sherry, the female in question, was about thirty-five years of age, and had been afflicted with deafness for a long period, and this probably has led to the impression that she was rather simple. Nothing, we believe, in her previous conduct was evinced to lead any person to suspect that she had any intention of taking her own life. She was missing from her home on Thursday evening, and was discovered late that night at the house of her brother Felix, (who lives on the same farm as his father) in her sister-in-law's bed. Her windpipe was completely severed, and yet it is affirmed she spoke, and told that she had performed the deed at the shore with a razor, and stuffed the apron into the wound until she reached the house. She expressed sorrow for her crime, committed the dreadful deed, Dr. Jameson, of St. John's, was promptly in attendance, but could render no effective aid to the unfortunate victim of self-murder, who died a few hours after.—S. Journal.

Late Telegrams.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—Gambetta telegraphs from headquarters of General Chanzy, that Chanzy continues taking many prisoners and inflicting heavy losses on the enemy. From this you will judge how false are the German despatches which state that the Army of the Loire was crushed. Chanzy, with only half that army, is still able to oppose successfully the German advance. In the last sortie from Paris, the loss of the French was 6700; and the Germans 8000. German loss in the battle of the Loire exceeds 7000. The German advance on Havre turned aside, and Dieppe was probably occupied to-day.

Consols steady, Liverpool markets quiet. The Times says there has been no military movement of importance since Saturday last. The Army of the Loire, although announced as again moving toward Paris, suffered immensely at Orleans. Entire Regiments were mowed down.

The weather is bitter cold in the Northern Departments, and the ground is covered with snow.

Three iron-clads have been ordered to Havre to assist in the operations of the Loire. The continued warfare, and preparations of all the Eastern Powers, cause suspicions in England that the Conference will be unable to settle the Black Sea question. There is little confidence in diplomacy.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—A despatch from Tours, on Friday, says that the war is not more firmly resolved on than ever.

Gambetta announces that, encouraged by the resistance of the army of the Loire, he has resolved to postpone the request for an armistice, and remain with the army.

The Duke of Mecklenburg telegraphs to his Duchess, a devout announcement of a victory at Meung on the 9th.

Havre is rapidly preparing for an attack. There seems to be but little doubt that the Prussians have determined to occupy Luxembourg, as a military necessity.

The French were repulsed, with loss of five cannons, at this point, on Friday.

Austria urges renewal of efforts for peace negotiations.

The latest despatches say that Ignatieff's interview with Alhassa is far from satisfactory, neither side was willing to yield a point.

Garibaldi has resigned, and returned to Italy.

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Despatches here announce a great battle between the German troops and the Army of the Loire at Beaugency, a town in the Department of Loiret, on the Loire, and on the railway from Orleans to Tours, fifteen miles southwest of Orleans.

On Thursday afternoon the battle was begun by the Germans, who made a severe attack upon the French, but were repulsed. On Friday the Germans renewed the battle, and after a long and bloody contest the French were defeated, losing a thousand prisoners, besides several thousand killed.

News from Paris is up to Friday. Great movements of Prussian troops are reported in progress. The military authorities are making preparations for another sortie on a grand scale.

A rumor is in circulation here, that the German troops under Manteuffel had invested Havre, proceeding thither after the defeat of the French, twelve miles from Havre. It is also rumored that a strong force of Germans were sent up by the Rouen and Dieppe Railroad to Dieppe, and that they succeeded in capturing that seaport. The rumors lack confirmation.

Some of the poorer German provinces are anxious for peace, and some are dissatisfied with the failure of the plans proposed for peace with the Government at Tours.

Despatches received from Brussels state that the Government of Belgium has resolved to send armed forces to the frontier, in order to prevent any infringement of the neutrality laws.

General Paladine has been offered the command of Clever, but has declined the offer. General Chanzy is now in command of the Army of the Loire.

General Manteuffel has sent a strong force to besiege Cleverburg, the great naval station of France, in the English Channel.

A despatch from Tours, dated this day at Paris, says that the Government proceeds immediately to Paris, through the aid of a bank movement from four corps of German soldiers which have been sent from Orleans in the direction of Bourges.

Despatches from Versailles via Berlin, state that a council of war was held at Versailles, Tuesday last. Present—King William, the Crown Prince Fritz, Counts von Moltke and Bismarck, and General Bismarck.

The subject discussed was the bombardment of Paris. It was concluded to bombard the city in the early part of the present week.

Beaumont, Massars, and Beaugency have been evacuated by the French.

The Germans have captured 1100 prisoners and 6 guns.

A Berlin telegram says the bombardment of Paris has been definitely settled upon.

A serious riot has occurred in Berlin, caused by an order that the married men must join the Landwehr. It still continues and threatens to spread over Germany.

LONDON, Dec. 13.—A despatch from Tours states that the Provisional French Government held a meeting on Saturday morning.

The repulse of the German attack at Beaugency, on Thursday, induced the Provisional Government to issue a card stating the fact, and calling the people to renewed exertions to drive the invaders from France.

Despatches have reached here, giving a telegram from the Duke of Mecklenburg, reporting that on Friday last, the forces under his command defeated the French at Beaugency, captured 1,600 prisoners and six cannons. At the same time, realizing their defeat, retreated upon Bourges.

Henry P. Anders, optician, had his sight destroyed by the bursting of a thermometer bulb. Judge Beaudry has decided that Promissory Notes of a Joint Stock Company are not legal, unless authorized by Directors, and regularly entered on books of Company and duly certified.

A snow storm has been blowing all day; it is very cold.

Quebec, Dec. 15.—Petition signed by Rev. Joseph M. Moreau and others has been presented, praying for aid to railway from Riviere du Loup to Woodville, by the Government.

Notice of motion is given that after the present session no Member of the Privy Council will be eligible for the Quebec Assembly.

Judge Roy will either retire shortly or ask for Supplementary Judge.

The Jesuits intend taking steps to recover the property known as the Jesuits' Panache, soon to be sold by auction, by the Dominion Government.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—King of Holland personally refused to send Dutch troops to Prussia. Reported King William makes no further advances, unless Luxembourg openly supports France. He telegraphed Luxembourg to that effect.

Monstrous number of sympathizers with the Pope held at Thuries, last evening. Speeches made and resolutions adopted, which strongly expressed opinion that Great Britain should defend the interests of her Catholic subjects now menaced in France.

French army again defeated on Loire.—No particulars.

At a meeting, yesterday, Cabinet considered Luxembourg question, and concluded not to take steps to prevent Prussia occupying territory, reserving further consideration in case of forcible annexation. Opinion is strengthened that Prussia will take Luxembourg and Holland instead of Alsace and Lorraine, and was content with the restoration of the Empire.

Baloon, with two passengers, and one hundred pounds weight, descended on the 15th, at Herborn, in Nassau.

Parisly descended to fight to the bitter end. New York.—Gold 110 1/4. Exchange steady.

SACKVILLE, Dec. 20, 1870. English Cabinet has decided not to do anything in case of invasion, but by force, but will require int. violation of neutrality, of which is alleged that Prussia has been guilty.

Rumored that Brunswick is annexed to Confederation. Russia supports demands of Prussia.

Tours despatch announces repulse of Grapd Duke Mecklenburg's army, by Gen. Chanzy. British Reliance expedition founded in Mediterranean—all on board, and also scientific instruments, saved.

Germans evacuated Amiens, and retired towards Clermont, but announced intention of returning soon.

Parliament meets 7th February, when the army and navy estimates will be instantly submitted.

The Prussians are leaving the valley of Char. concentrated in the direction of neutrality, they attacked Gen. Chanzy, but were repulsed.

A thousand Kabylo horsemen landed at Toulon to join French armies.
