Very Frightened

Majava was described today as "very sober and very frightened." Veterans Make Up 45 Per Cent Of Special Brigade

OTTAWA, Sept. 18 (CP) - Veterans of the Second World War make up about 45 per cent of the Canadian army special force, being trained for service in Korea or elsewhere. Defence Minister Claxton said today in a statement. Mr. Claxton said enlistments in the special force now have passed the 9,000 mark. The figures do not include the 1,000 active force personnel already assigned or to be assigned to the special force. At the end of August, the force's strength totalled 8,372, including 3,813 veterans of the Second World War. These included 768 men who served as non-commissioned officers in the last war. The force included 2,630 married men, or about 30 per cent of the total strength. Officer strength now is 235 and more applications are being studied. There still is a requirement for more junior officers, said Mr. Claxton. The force is expected to leave Canada about mid-November to complete training, possibly on Okinawa Island in the Pacific. Mr. Claxton also reported a steady increase in the strength of the army's active force with more than 1,800 new enlistments since the recruiting drive was launched July 20. Navy and air force figures tabulated Sept. 9 showed that since July 20 the navy attested 542 new recruits and the R. C. A. F. 693 327 for air crew and 371 for ground crew. WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 (AP) - The Senate confirmed today the appointment of former Mayor William O'Dwyer of New York City to be United States Ambassador to Mexico. Credit controls then are expected to be prepared "without delay."

Sees Advance To Manchurian Border

SOMEWHERE IN KOREA, Sept. 18 (AP) - P. H. Shinicky, Chairman of the Korean National Assembly, said today he believed United Nations forces will not stop at the 38th parallel, which divides North and South Korea. Shinicky said the U. N. forces would go to the Manchurian border to unify the country. It has been divided since the end of the war with Japan.

Search For Missing Vessel Abandoned

HALIFAX, Sept. 18 (CP) - The search for a missing swordfishing boat and her six crew members was abandoned tonight. R. C. A. F. Search and Rescue centre here said aircraft and ships had covered the area off southwestern Nova Scotia thoroughly without finding a trace of the 50-foot Sir Echo. The Sir Echo, out of Wood's Harbour, N. S., disappeared last Tuesday as a howling Atlantic hurricane whipped along the Nova Scotia coast.

British Election Date Hinges On Events Today

By ALAN HARVEY LONDON, Sept. 18 (CP) - Chances of a British general election hinge on what happens tomorrow in the House of Commons. This seemed a safe prophecy tonight after Government informants, confounding the general tenor of political thinking, made known that Prime Minister Clement Attlee does not regard the present time as suitable for a new appeal to the country. Previous forecasts said the Government contemplated a fall election. A poll will be held, it was stated officially, only if the ruling Labor Party loses tomorrow's vital vote on iron and steel nationalization. Parliamentary division is scheduled for 10:00 P.M. (8 P.M. E.D.T.) and could easily go either way. The Government so far has squeezed through in all crucial divisions held since it was re-elected last February with a single-figure majority. This time it looks closer than ever. Defeat on the nationalization issue would mean the downfall of the Government and an election within a month. One west-end bookmaker-Britons bet on almost anything - announced odds of 9 to 4 against the administration losing tomorrow's vote. On paper, Labor has an over-all majority of seven against Conservatives, Conservative supporters, Liberals, and one Independent. But there are many complicating factors, including illness or absenteeism for other unavoidable reasons. Labor is known to have seven men on the sick list, six of whom are expected to vote anyway. The Conservative tally is a closely-guarded secret. There will be at least one pairing - Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, who is out of the country, and Conservative Oliver Stanley who is ill.
