

PM Described As Friend Of Little Man, Province

Describing John Diefenbaker as a friend of the little man and of the small provinces, Healey Macquarrie, P.C. candidate for Queens last night addressed a packed hall at Mt. Ryan on Dominion-Provincial relations as it affected Islanders as individuals.

Mr. Macquarrie pointed to the \$2,500,000 yearly grant as well as corresponding grants to the other Atlantic provinces. He noted that recently the Prime Minister had increased aid to Island National and provincial parks.

He referred to veterans pensions and allowances, noting they were higher than ever before and emphasized the increase in old age security.

Mr. Macquarrie also commended the action of the provincial government, which in conjunction with the Federal Government is providing insulin in free of charge to all Islanders suffering from diabetes.

Captain Campbell joined the marine department of the Department of Transport in 1910 as an ordinary seaman and served on a number of dignitary vessels the first being the CGS Stanley.

Returning to Canada, Capt. Campbell then joined the first CGS Brant, the 100-foot wooden hulled department boat. It was while serving aboard her that he met his wife, Mrs. Brant, in 1927 when the first Brant was decommissioned.

Fishermen Concerned As Ice Moves To East

Fishermen at Naufrage were concerned last night with a large ice floe that has been moving slowly eastward for the last few days. Last night it was reported as St. Peter's Harbor.

The fishermen expected the ice to reach their area by tonight but not many plan on bringing in traps as they are going to attempt this morning to rig them with ice poles.

Fishing was reported fairly good in the Naufrage area yesterday but poor in Souris and Fortune. At Naufrage two boats came in with 700 pounds each while at Souris catches were estimated at being one pound to every three traps.

Comparatively light losses were reported from the Sea View, New London areas after the ice field which hovered lobster gear there a few days ago drifted eastward.

James Costas, who operates a packing factory at Park Corner, said that losses reported by fishermen were light.

DAMAGE LIGHT? "We had a few boats out with lines, and we had no losses," he said. Others "with short lines attached to buoys" had some losses. It's still too early to say definitely, but it looks now as though losses will not be as bad as feared. Mr. Costas has been at Rustico, the ice had "pretty well gone out."

Several fishermen had punched their way through the remaining ice. One man, who hauled 50 traps yesterday, took 30 pounds, which was considered "fairly good", and the appearance so far has been reasonably good, veteran fishermen there felt.

There were comparatively few traps out - perhaps 1,500 from the Rustico-Oyster Bod area - and it was still too early to assess trap and gear loss, though most fishermen were hopeful would be light.

Birchwood High Cadet Selected For Course

Cadet Capt. Kenneth Hubley of the Birchwood High School Corps has been chosen to attend a special cadet at Banff, Alta., this summer.

He will represent Prince Edward Island at the camp and is one of seven cadets from the Eastern Command area.

The select group chosen for the five-week camp are picked according to their school ability as students and must not only be outstanding cadets, but also must have a high scholastic standing and take part in school athletics.

Prior to leaving for Banff, Cadet Capt. Hubley will attend camp at Alesford. He will leave on this course July 1.

In addition to being second in command of the Birchwood Corps, Cadet Captain Hubley ranks among the top 10 in his grade 10 class and is a member

of the school's senior basketball team.

Harold Arnold Ellsworth, St. Louis was fined a similar amount when he pleaded guilty to driving a truck with more than two adult passengers in the cab.

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20 Kings College Students To Aid In Parish Training

A group of 20 Kings College students will arrive in the province Sunday night as part of a parish training program of the Diocese of Nova Scotia. This is the first year that a group from the college has visited the Island. They will remain until May 22.

Participating in the training program will be Archdeacon J.T. Abbott, of P.E.I., Canon J.R. Davis, rural dean and members of the clergy of the diocese. The director, will be the Rev. E.J. Skelton, of Kings College, and the rural committee of the diocese.

The program is designed to assist students by giving them some practical parish experience under supervision. The program is now integrated with a continuing course given at the college. This method aims to have practically all parish experience before ordination under supervision.

There are six distinct steps in the program and include: a course for supervisors; a parish training school for students; the parish work of the students under the supervisors; an evaluation conference for students; an evaluation course for supervisors and the follow up of college and supervision of any winter work.

The plan has been made possible by the co-operation of diocesan authorities, the divinity faculty of Kings College and the rural committee of the diocese.

Heavy Quake Rocks Mexico

MEXICO CITY (AP) - A heavy earthquake rocked South-Central Mexico Friday. Two persons were reported killed near the Pacific coast of Acapulco in Mexico City, where the quake lasted nine seconds, a man dropped dead of shock. Officials said about 100 persons had been reported injured. Of these 30 were in Acapulco, one of the hardest hit areas, and 30 in the capital. There were no reports of tourist casualties.

Widespread damage was reported but it appeared to be minor. The government was checking reports from around Mexico, near Acapulco, that the earthquake was touched off by a volcano.

Ballanger, 53, died when a home-made bomb exploded in his jeep. He was the father of 13 children.

The verdict set Aug. 17 as the date of the execution.

MONTREAL (CP) - Don Fontana, 30, Toronto advertising executive, Friday was named captain of the 11-man Davis Cup tennis team against the United States in Cleveland July 13-17.

Francis Godbout, 34, of Westwood, Que., also was named to the team.

One or two other players will be named to the team later from among a young group. Earlier this year Canada's main tennis player, Robert Beaudou, 30, of Lacombe, Que., announced his retirement from Davis Cup and international tournament tennis.
