Canadian Oil Production, Reserves Causing Concern

Mr. Lounsbury says that such reserves are unlikely to be discovered in the next five years. He says gross additions to reserves are unlikely to rise to this extent "for the ratio of reserves to production need will remain as high as at present, but even allowing for this the exploration program must considerably exceed the average level of the last five years."

It is reasonable to assume that expenditures for exploration will rise by as much as 25 per cent above the average of the last five years, an exploration program that seems feasible in view of the industry's income prospects.

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Industrial Safety Conference Set

By DON MACLEOD The annual "Paired Staff Writer" food presentation from Island industry is looked for at the province's first conference on industrial safety which will be held Thursday next at the Charlottetown Hotel.

The conference is being sponsored by the P. R. I. Workmen's Compensation Board. The importance of such a conference was stressed yesterday by board secretary M. E. Campbell. "Such conferences have been very successful in other provinces," he said, "but here we are sort of breaking new ground. A good safety program is needed here. Foremen and plant supervisors should be educated in safety procedures. Workers should take safety to be as much a part of their job as production. It has been proven that a poor safety man has a poor production record."

Mr. Campbell said that the day's events will include the showing of safety films, panel discussions, and exhibits of safety equipment. "We have some excellent films on industrial safety sent us by the Canadian Industrial Safety Association," he said. A panel on accident causes, investigation and control will be moderated by J. M. McLeod, safety director for Maritime Electric. Other panel members will be J. C. Whalen, safety director for Family Gyrosum Company Limited, Windsor, N.S.; H. L. Livingston, manager of I. E. Shaw Company Limited, Halifax, N. S.; and W. H. Gates, engineer for Canadian Keyes Fiber Company Limited, Hantsport, N. S. Mr. Campbell said that "five or six companies that manufacture safety equipment will furnish the exhibits for the conference. All types of equipment for head, eye, body and foot protection will be shown. An outline on the methods of setting up safety committees in industry will be given by R. M. McCall, manager of the Nova Scotia Accident Prevention Association.

The conference will open at 8:30 with registration of delegates and will wind up with a dinner during which the day's activities will be reviewed. A guest speaker for the dinner is being arranged.

According to Mr. Campbell, letters will be going out to about 200 firms on the Island and union representatives giving details of the conference. One of the main aspects of the conference will be to show Island industry the amount of assistance available from various accident prevention and safety associations for the setting up of an adequate safety program.

JFK Abolishes Non-Red Oath In Student Loan

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy has signed legislation that abolishes the Communist oath as a condition for U.S. government loans to students. Kennedy, in a statement, said the requirement of an affidavit had prompted 32 U.S. colleges to shut the student loan program under the National Defense Education Act.

France Sells Surplus Grain To Red China

PARIS (AP)—France is disposing of part of its surpluses of cereals through sales to Red China. The French ministry for economic affairs said. A spokesman said France and Red China have signed an agreement last year for sale of 1,000,000 tons of cereals over a three-year period. Wheat made up the major part of the sale. The balance of the price is payable at the time of embarkation, with the remaining part to be paid within 12 months. Negotiations now are in progress for the sale of an additional 600,000 tons of cereals, to be delivered from 1965 and later.

Halibut Catch Called Record

SEATTLE (AP)—The greatest catch and highest earnings in history were made this season by United Fishermen's Canadian halibut fishermen in the Pacific. The International Pacific Halibut Commission reports. Commission records show that, with the close of the final season in the Bering Sea this year, the total catch was 75,200,000 pounds, 3,000,000 pounds higher than the previous high in 1960.

Lumber Talks Are Concluded

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian and American government representatives have concluded two days of talks in Ottawa. The U.S. side indicated that the controversy has been resolved. The only concrete statement in the communiqué was that an ad hoc joint expert working group of government officials of Canada and the U.S. would be established to examine jointly a variety of matters.

Asbestos Surplus Forecast In U.S.

WASHINGTON (CP)—A U.S. company which specializes in mining surveys says new asbestos production planned in Canada and the U.S. indicates heavy surpluses may appear by mid-1963. Geo-Surveys predicted in a statement that production will be so heavy there will be more than a job for every man who get out under the collar. "So much new production is in sight that survival threatens to become a question of new outlets or diversification into less competitive products."
