What is a Cenotaph?

Sir.—What is a Cenotaph? Literally from its derivation it evidently means 'an empty tomb,' and among the Greeks the original word was used of a monument erected to a person buried elsewhere.

Chambers' Cyclopaedia says of the English word: "They were originally erected for those whose bones could not be found, e. g., for those who perished at sea. Latterly the term was applied to tombs built by a man during his lifetime for himself and his family."

Richardson's large English Dictionary defines the word thus: "An empty tomb erected in honor of one to whom the rites of burial had been performed elsewhere; or of one to whom no rites of burial had been performed at all."

Webster says: "An empty tomb erected in honor of some deceased person; a monument erected to one who is buried elsewhere."

In your Saturday's paper the term was used of a monument erected on the very spot where the body is interred. Is there any authority for this meaning being given to the word?

[In Roge's Thesaurus, the word "cenotaph" is placed in the same category as "sarcophagus," "tomb," "crypt," "shrine," etc. Its use in connection with the memorial placed over the grave of Father McGillivray is not due to THE EXAMINER but to those who erected the memorial.]
