A resume of the year's work was read by the retiring secretary, and the members felt that a satisfactory amount of charitable projects, and help to the district had been given during the year.

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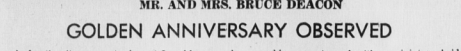
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RECENT BRIDE

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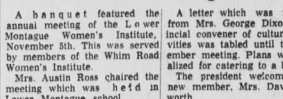

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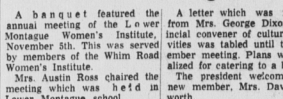
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
