## Accused Testify In Assault Case

ALBERTON — Three Tignish residents, Benoit Gaudet, Raymond Gaudette and Edgar Gaudet, charged with assaulting Tignish policeman Howard Foley, causing actual bodily harm, took the stand in their own defense yesterday at Alberton before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald.

Represented by Bruce MacDonald, Benoit Gaudet and Raymond Gaudette claimed they took no part in the assault but admitted being intoxicated at the time of the incident last June 3 and Gaudette said he "couldn't remember exactly what occurred" but didn't think he hit or kicked Foley.

Edgar Gaudet, a brother of

Benoit, admitted striking the policeman twice with his fists and said they then drove away leaving Foley on the ground.

A defense motion to amend the charge from causing bodily harm to common assault will be reviewed on Jan. 6 at 9:30 when the case will be resumed in court at Summerside.

The prosecution was conducted by George McMahon.

Foley testified in an affidavit at the parochial house in Alberton to an amount not exceeding \$50, Joseph Merrill Arsenault, Alberton, was fined \$50 and costs.

Joseph Carl Doyle, Tignish, was fined \$50 and costs for failing to stop after an accident with another vehicle.

Summerside — A young Mt. Pleasant man, Russell William Bell, who pleaded guilty yesterday in Prince County Court to a charge of taking the care of Kenneth MacLeod without the owner's consent, was remanded in custody by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald to Tuesday morning, Dec. 21, for sentencing.

The court was told by the investigating officer, RCMP Constable Eric Bishop, that the accused had driven the vehicle around the countryside and gone off the road after entering a farmer's yard where he killed two pigs in a barn with the vehicle.

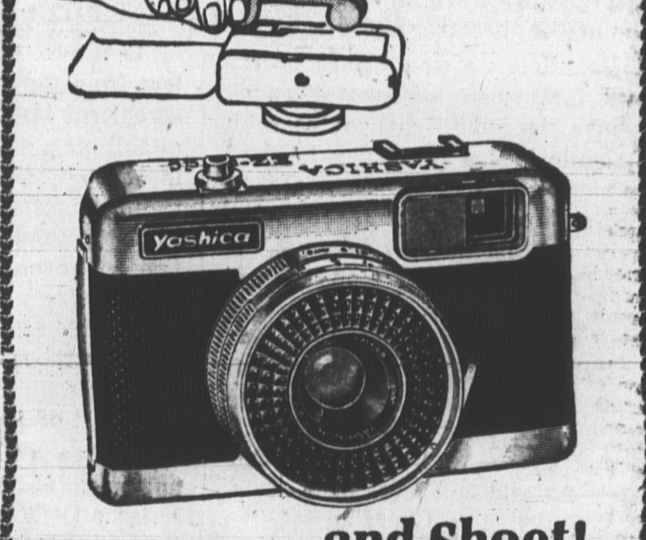

## Heroism Medal Winner Has Island Relatives

SUMMERSIDE — An American soldier, Staff Sgt. Frederick C. Burk, whose mother is the former Amy Campbell, R.N., of Park Corner, has been awarded the Soldiers Medal for heroism in Germany.

Sgt. Burk, who is a son of Swampscoot, Mass. Parks Division Superintendent Frederick C. Burk and Mrs. Burk, is credited with saving the lives of two persons trapped in the wreckage of a flaming automobile in 1964.

The citation, presented with the medal, states Sgt. Burk "was driving on a road in Oberwarngau, Germany, when he witnessed a motor vehicle crash in which one of the cars immediately burst into flames. He stopped his car, rushed toward the burning vehicle with a fire extinguisher and attempted to put out the fire in the blazing car occupied by an American soldier and a German girl. He succeeded in quelling the fire but he disregarded his own safety, entered the flaming vehicle, removed the unconscious girl and placed her by the side of the road.

## Montague Citizen Dies Wed. At Murray River

MONTAGUE — R.W. Beck, a well known and much respected business man of Montague died suddenly yesterday at Murray River. At the time of his death he was in company with workmen cutting wood.

He was born at Allison and was in his 72nd year.

While a young man he entered into the monument business with his father, the late Vasey Beck. Following the death of his father he moved the business to Montague where it has flourished and expanded ever since.

In 1929 a branch office was opened in Charlottetown and for a number of years the firm has been doing business in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

The late Mr. Beck was very active in community affairs. He took an active part in the work of the Church of Christ, having served as an elder for over 40 years. He also served in many years as trustee of Alberta Bible College.

In business he was a past president of the Canadian Association of Memorial Craftsmen and a charter member of the Monument Institute of America. He was a charter member of the Community Welfare League Ltd., a past member of the Montague Town Council where he served several terms; a charter member of the Montague Curling Club, and was a member of the first team to represent Prince Edward Island at the Macdonald-Brier; an active member of the board of trade; in politics he was an active member of the Liberal party.

He leaves to mourn besides his wife, the former Margaret Martin of Glen Martin, two brothers: John at Allison and Tyler at Montague. Two sisters and two brothers predeceased him. Also surviving are five daughters: Vera at Home; Mrs. Jack McIntyre (Peggy) in Charlottetown; Mrs. W.L. Giffin (Betty Anne) of Halifax; Mrs. Paul Jenkins (Barbara) Charlottetown; and two sons, Dr. Malcolm Beck of Charlottetown, and R. Ralph Beck, who will carry on the family business.
