WHY AN ELECTION NOW?

As election before the year was ended is what everyone anticipated. Yet there is no necessity for an election until next February or March.

But the Premier's reason for holding an election before the end of the year is evident. If an election were held in January or February, the public accounts could be demanded by the people, and the scandalous boodling operations of the present year would be laid bare.

Their fear concerning the accounts of the present year is the more evident in view of the fact that no announcement has yet been made that the extraordinary legislation of last session has been approved by the Minister of Justice.

Wherever the British flag flies the majority rule—except in Prince Edward Island; and the exception is here only because the Minister of Justice has not reported in favor of the disallowance of the two-thirds clause.

THE NEWFOUNDLAND ELECTIONS. The Newfoundland elections are over, and the Government has been handsomely sustained.

THE MOCK PARLIAMENT. There was a good attendance of visitors as well as members at the regular weekly meeting of this assembly last night.

At the close of the debate the resolution was lost by a large two-thirds vote. The leader of the Opposition then announced that having been defeated by the vote just taken, their resignation would be placed in the hands of His Honor, the Governor.

A considerable gain to Canada will come through the favorable impression produced abroad by this victory, and the dairy farmers in the different parts of the Dominion will be encouraged and stimulated to pay more attention to a further development of this branch of farming.

The immediate effect of this sweeping achievement at Chicago will be to still further enhance the reputation of our cheese in the British markets. It will also further stimulate our dairymen to pay more attention to the home end of the business.

As an advertising means, the big cheese at the World's Fair has, perhaps, been one of the best hits of the year. It has been paraphrased and commented on by at least two-thirds of the newspapers of this country and Europe.
