Inconvenience Of Sunday Funerals Pointed Out By Ministerial Association

Rev. Marvel D. Dunbar, pastor of the Central Christian Church, yesterday was elected president of the Prince Edward Island Ministerial Association at the annual meeting held in the Y. M. C. A. One of the principal topics of discussion was the decision to ask the co-operation of the public in not requesting the holding of funerals on Sunday. It was pointed out that rural clergymen with more than one church in their charge were frequently prevented from holding Sunday services because of funerals. No hard and fast rule was laid down at the meeting, but it was agreed that wherever possible the public would be asked not to request Sunday funerals in order to permit the ministers to hold services. It was felt that many congregations were being deprived of the presence of their ministers due to the present prevalence of the practice, and under the circumstances it was unfair to them.

P.W.C. Principal Addresses Business Women's Club

An informative address on "Symbols and Ceremonials in Government," was given by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of Prince of Wales College, as guest speaker at the November dinner meeting of the Business and Professional Women's Club held last night at the Charlottetown. With about sixty members present, the President, Mrs. Dorothy Rogers, gave a short talk on parliamentary procedure, followed by a discussion on the qualifications necessary to entitle a woman to vote in civic elections. Introduced by Miss Isabelle Storey, Dr. MacKinnon discussed the place of decorative functions in democratic government. "The functions associated with Royalty, Governors-General, and Lieutenant-Governors are useful in providing colour in public affairs which otherwise might be very dull. As much public business is conducted in social functions as in meetings and conferences. It has its important place, provided that it is not taken too seriously."
