two, catching the singleton king. After cashing the ace of diamonds, he ruffed another heart, thus reducing his trump holding to the K-Q-J. West still had the 8-6-4.

The problem of whether the adverse diamonds were originally divided 3-3 or 4-2 now became important.

If the distribution was 3-3, the hand could be made by drawing two rounds of trumps, then cashing the Q-J of clubs, after which a heart from dummy could be ruffed to permit the 10-6 of clubs to be cashed.

But if the original diamond distribution was 4-2, three rounds of trumps would have to be drawn, and the contract could not then be made by the same line of play because there would be no way of cashing the 10-6 of clubs.

Grunwald decided it was unlikely the diamonds would break 3-3 in a hand so markedly freshish. So to cover the likelihood that there would be a 4-2 trump break, he arranged his play so as to establish a later entry to his hand to cash his fourth and fifth clubs.

He led the king of diamonds, discarding a heart from dummy as both defenders followed suit. He then cashed the Q-J of diamonds, discarding from dummy the A-K of spades!

Declarer's brilliant play was duly rewarded when he next cashed the Q-J of clubs and led the six of spades from dummy. East took the queen but had only spades left and was forced to return one to South's jack. So declarer wound up with twelve tricks consisting of six diamonds, five clubs, and a spade.

But if Grunwald had failed to discard the A-K of spades from dummy, he would have wound up going down one!

Yanks, Reds Sign Accord

MOSCOW (Reuters) — The United States and Russia signed a two-year agreement Saturday for co-operation in fields ranging from ideas to tourists.

The 27-page document, result of two weeks of talks here between delegations from both sides, calls for exchanges in science, technology, education and culture.

It envisages introduction of direct air flights between Moscow and New York and also provides for the long-running Broadway musical My Fair Lady to be staged in Russia by an American company.

The agreement was signed by American Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson and Yuri Zhukov, chairman of the Soviet state committee for cultural links with foreign countries.

MARKED CHANGES

Thompson said after the ceremony the fact the agreement had taken only two weeks to prepare showed marked changes had occurred in relations between the two countries since the last agreement was signed in January, 1958.

While the American-Russian agreement was being sealed, however, Britain's first book exhibition in Moscow opened minus about 30 publications banned by Soviet officials for giving a "false impression" of Soviet policy.

The new agreement provides for approximately the same level of exchanges of delegations as the previous one and in some fields — agriculture for instance — for a somewhat reduced level.

It provides for the development of co-operation in the peaceful uses of atomic energy. The agreement expressed the wish that joint work be organized in this field.

The agreement also seeks to encourage tourism, enabling visitors to travel more widely in both countries.

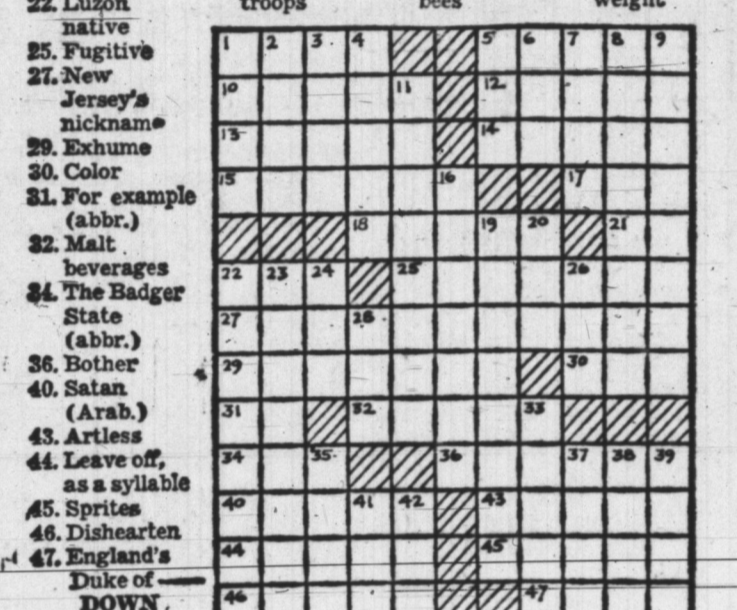
RIPLEY'S BELIEVE IT OR NOT

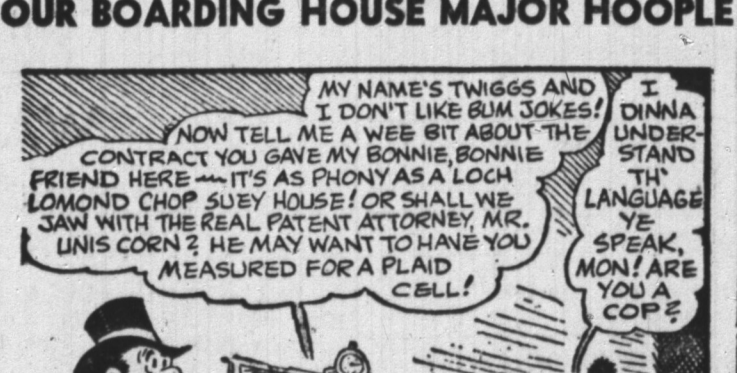

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Cus D'Amato Surrenders Self
NEW YORK (AP) — Troubled Cus D'Amato Friday surrendered to state authorities and immediately was charged with violating the general business law for failing to respond to a subpoena. A warrant had been issued for his arrest.
The crew-cut, 51-year-old manager of former world heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson was released in \$2,500 bail for trial in special sessions court Dec. 14.
Shortly after this action, the state athletic commission announced it would render a decision Monday on its inquiry into alleged irregularities in the promotion of the Patterson-Ingemar Johansson heavyweight title fight at Yankee Stadium last June 26.
The commission has made five charges against D'Amato, and three against Bill Rosensohn, promoter of the fight. The commission had suspended both and revoked the licence of Rosensohn Enterprises, Inc., the firm which handled the contest.
