Lower Freetown Man Gets Three Months Jail Sentence

Appearing for sentence on a charge of false pretences, Robert Matthews, Lower Freetown, was sentenced to three months in the Queen's County Jail by Magistrate A. J. Haslam in city police court yesterday.

Two Charlottetown residents pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct, street fighting, and Donald Edward MacPherson was fined \$25 and costs or 10 days in jail, and Raymond MacDonald, \$20 and costs or 10 days.

Souris Bus Uses Detour

Only one IMT bus route has been altered because of bridge washouts. IMT employee said yesterday.

The route from Charlottetown to Souris was severed Monday when the highway bridge at St. Peter's collapsed and buses to the eastern point will be routed through Forest Hills on a secondary road. Highway crews have been working on the road and it is said to be in good condition.

All other routes taken by IMT buses were relatively unaffected by the flooding conditions. Although the Trans-Canada Highway to Summerside is severed, the bus to Summerside normally uses the old Malpeque to the eastern point which was unaffected by the floods.

The IMT dispatcher said that the mainline bus Monday had a busy day as the bus made three trips from Aulic to Amherst carrying railway passengers across a flooded section of railway line.
