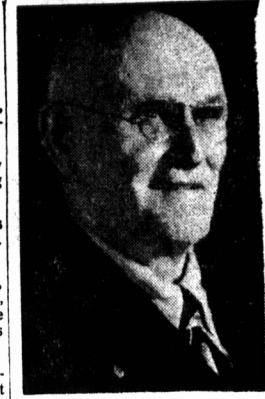

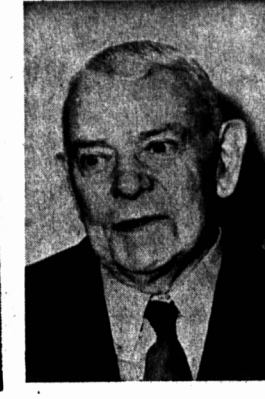

### Further Increase In Unemployment Figures

Figures released by the National Employment Office in Charlottetown yesterday revealed 2327 people drawing Unemployment Insurance benefits in King's and Queen's Counties. This was an advance over the previous week of 37.

Almost two-thirds or 1639 are residents of the country as distinct from Charlottetown. Charlottetown and the Royalties accounted for 688, an increase of 2 over the previous week.

The figures are the highest reached this year and are believed to be very near the peak for the year.

As the week drew to an end a number of drivers from a local bus company filed claims, when road conditions affected travel by road. A large trucking and transportation company also released some men, and these too became benefit claimants.

### Radioactive Vial Worth \$20

CHALK RIVER, Ont. (CP)—Scientists at the atomic energy project here found a radioactive vial shipped from Port Arthur, Ont., to be worth about \$20 and dangerous only if swallowed or inhaled.

A spokesman said Friday that tests on the vial showed it is "a luminous compound consisting largely of zinc sulphide and containing a very small quantity of radium."

The total amount of radium is 35-millionths of an ounce worth about \$20. The vial was shipped here after being turned over to RCMP by John MacDonald, a Beardmore, Ont., prospector who said he found it during the Second World War from the Dutch underground.

Reports that it was of great value and was dangerous caused considerable excitement and the vial was placed in the Port Arthur General Hospital radium vault.

### Fewer Divorces Granted In 1954

OTTAWA (CP)—There were five per cent fewer divorces granted in Canada last year than in 1953, the bureau of statistics reported Friday. The decline follows an 8.4-per-cent increase in 1953 over 1952.

Number of divorces last year was 5,800 compared with 6,110 in 1953 and 5,634 in 1952. The record is 6,199, set in 1947.

Increases in number of divorces in 1954 were recorded in Quebec and Nova Scotia.

Divorces by provinces in 1954 (with 1953 figures in brackets): Newfoundland 8 (9); Prince Edward Island 8 (15); Nova Scotia 258 (245); New Brunswick 117 (118); Quebec 370 (273).

### Little Theatre Studio Night

Last Thursday evening, being a "Studio Night," the members of the Charlottetown Little Theatre took part in what might be called a "Classical Experiment".

Professor Coyle's introductions to Shakespearean Scenes were one of the highlights of the evening. These excerpts were produced with a minimum of stage-setting and in modern costume. There were several good performances as some of Shakespeare's best-loved characters came to life on the stage. Worthy of special mention is Bert Foster's portrayal of Mark Antony.

Moliere's "Love's Best Doctor," directed by Rev. Father Arsenault, was a tremendous success. This lighthearted piece of buffoonery by France's "Shakespeare" delighted the audience. Milton Acorn gave a splendid performance as the rascally old "Sganarelle," and the three doctors left little to be desired. The make-up in this production merits special attention. It was customary to use masks in this type of play. On Thursday evening the masks were painted directly on the faces of the actors using poster paints with great effect.
