The little wars in India are going on favorably. The Tibetan expedition is practically at an end, but another little war has broken out in the Black Mountains in the North of India.

General Boulanger is back again in Paris, after a tour in Spain, during which he has contrived to keep up some public interest in his proceedings by involving his movements in mystery.

The French President is clearly something more than the mere upright man of business he was supposed to be when he was elected. He is taking pains to know and be known by the electors in all parts of France, and appears to be gaining a more stable place in the estimation of the people than any of the shifting statesmen by whom he is surrounded.

On the re-assembling of the Parnell commission on Thursday, Attorney General Webster resumed his address in behalf of the Times. The Freeman's Journal asserts that over 200 Irish policemen have been placed at the disposal of the London Times as witnesses who may be useful in proving its charges against the Parnellites.

A handsome offer has been made to Col. Robert G. Ingersoll by a foreign manager to deliver forty lectures in Europe next spring.

Mr. Alexander Anderson, electrician, son of Dr. Anderson, of the Prince of Wales College, arrived home from Lynn, Mass., last night.

The New Free Press says that the idea of a marriage between Prince Alexander of Battenberg, and Princess Victoria, a sister of the German Emperor, has been abandoned.

The fund to defray the expenses of the defence of Parnell and his associates in meeting the charges brought by the London Times now amounts to \$55,000.

Miss Margaret White, a Dundas, Ont., maiden of 35, has sued Elijah Binkley, a West Flamboro patriarch of 70, for \$5,000 for breach of promise.

The leading incident of the German Emperor's European tour has been made the subject of paintings, drawings and photographs which will be reproduced and published with notes.

Daniel Hand, an aged resident of Guilford, Conn., has given the American Missionary Association a million dollars, to be known as the "Daniel Hand educational fund for colored people," the income to be used in educating negroes in former slave states.
