INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.

Revenue and Expenditure.

A Very Good Showing.

OTTAWA, Aug 25
The Intercolonial Railway statements for the last fiscal year, just compiled, show that the revenue was \$2,945,441, and the expenditure \$3,439,377—a deficit of \$493,936. This showing is \$200,000 better than the previous fiscal year. It is gratifying to know that the past two months are also satisfactory as regards revenue, and the prospects of attaining a good balance sheet for the current year are at present bright.

THE ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

Protest of the Press

Against Kibblesdale's Appointment.

LONDON, Aug. 25.
Gladstone has been re-elected for Midlothian without opposition. The election in Derby for a successor to Sir William Vernon Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, was held yesterday. Sir William's opponent was Farmer Atkinson, whose candidature the Liberals treated as a jest. Sir William was re-elected by 6,505 votes to 1,619 for Atkinson.

The Star and Chronicle each protest against Mr. Gladstone's re-appointing the post of Master of the Royal Buckhounds by the appointment of Lord Kibblesdale. The papers hold that the continuance of the post sanctions elaborate cruelty to animals. "This is one more point," says the Chronicle, "on which Mr. Gladstone has alienated the sympathy of democracy."

The Deadly Cholera

PEOPLE DYING BY THE HUNDRED

At St. Petersburg and Elsewhere.

LONDON, Aug. 25.
A despatch from Hamburg says that cholera has broken out in all parts of the city and suburbs, although the outbreak is worst in the labor quarters, where 27 cases are reported.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 25.
There were 5,505 new cases of cholera reported throughout Russia yesterday and 2,659 deaths. This is a decrease of 430 new cases and 770 deaths compared with Monday's figures.

TEHERAN, Aug. 25.
The ravages of cholera here are frightful. Sanitary regulations are almost unknown and the fatalistic tendencies of the people make it almost impossible to combat disease. Eight hundred persons died yesterday. The city has a population of 146,000, but is so unhealthy in summer that the Shah's court and upper classes invariably leave it during the season.

SQUALL STRIKES A BOAT.

One Occupant Drowned.

The Other Narrowly Escapes

INGONISH, Aug. 25.
James G. Winn and his son Joseph, of Aspy Bay, were crossing North Harbor from Dingwall to their home on the opposite side, on Monday evening about dark, when a squall struck them and capsized the boat. Both occupants were thrown out, and swam for the shore about two hundred yards away. The son landed in an exhausted condition, but the father was drowned, having probably taken oramps.

THE WORLD'S FAIR.

A Pertinent Question.

HAMILTON, Aug. 25.
The Spectator recommends that the Dominion Minister stop preparations for a Canadian exhibit at Chicago next year, and asks why Canada should spend \$100,000 to aid a country which declares commercial war against her, and which may declare non-intercourse before the exhibition opens.

Lee's Defalcations.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 25.
An examination of the papers of G. Herbert Lee, the absconding lawyer now in Boston was made yesterday. It showed that he had speculated extensively in the New York, Chicago and Boston markets. This sort of thing will foot all up to \$90,000. Steps are being taken to extradite him for trial here.

The Strike Off.

PUEFFALO, Aug. 25.
The conference of labor leaders have informed Sweeney that they will not join the switchmen's strike. The strike was officially declared off by Grand Master Sweeney of the switchmen's union at midnight last night.

The Tolls Involved

OTTAWA, Aug. 25.
The estimated amount of tolls involved in the recent Washington proclamation will not amount to more than \$800 for the remainder of the present season.
