A Montreal Sensation.

MONTREAL, June 23. A great sensation has been caused here by the publication of a Roman Catholic pastoral which denounces secret societies in the most vigorous language. The pastoral deals with four points, first: "what is Freemasonry?" (including all other secret societies) second, "what is the true aim of these societies?" and what means do they employ to attain their aims?" third, "what dangers are encountered by those who join such societies?" fourth, "what is to be done by those who have allowed themselves to be seduced by these societies?" "Freemasonry is hotly denounced as an organization of men without religious principles who are bound together by the most horrible oaths and are under the direction of invisible leaders who make war against the church and against society." The principle aim and object of all secret societies is said to be to substitute paganism for Christianity, and the destruction of all religious, moral and social discipline. The Knights of Labor are especially and bitterly denounced.

The Future of Halifax.

HALIFAX, June 23. General Sir Donald Stewart, Sir George Stephen and Vice-President Van Horne, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, were here yesterday inspecting the terminal facilities of the harbor of Halifax. The party speak in the most hopeful manner of the early establishment of a fast line of steamers which shall connect Liverpool with Hong Kong, via Halifax, for the conveyance of mails, passengers and high-class freight, and they also predict the completion, within eighteen months, of the Short Line road to Montreal, and say that hereafter all British troops destined for China and India will pass through Halifax and over the Canada Pacific.
