The despatches from London state that the Shah's arrival there a few days ago was made the occasion of an imposing display of troops, and that vast throngs of people stood for hours in the broiling sun to catch a glimpse of him as he rode in a carriage with the Prince of Wales and kept his forefinger to his black lambskin fez in recognition of the salutes of the people along the line.

There appears to be some little prosperity in the Dominion notwithstanding the cry of the Grit press and politicians that the country is "going to the dogs," and that "blue ruin" stares us in the face.
