Tignish To Hold Plebiscite Under Village Service Act

Twenty-five residents of Tignish have petitioned Mr. J. Hubert Hall, sheriff of Prince County, to hold a plebiscite in that village to determine whether or not the majority of residents wish to incorporate under the Village Service Act.

Those sponsoring the petition have said that the proposed incorporated area will be about 500 acres in area, and will contain between 100-200 people.
Sheriff Hall acting in accordance with the provisions of the act, has posted notice of the plebiscite in the post office in Tignish, together with a list of eligible voters, to which any eligible name can be added prior to the plebiscite which will be held on Thursday, September 18.

Only residents of the described area as are seized or possessed of real or personal property to the value of \$325 or upwards are entitled to vote.
The proposed area of incorporation is described as "commencing at the intersection of the road known as the Doucette or Settlement Road and the Western Road thence southwesterly along the Western Road to Campbell's bridge on the Tignish River, thence eastwardly along the north bank of the Tignish river to Myrick's bridge, thence northwardly along the Kildare Cape Road to the Doucette or Settlement Road, thence westwardly along this road to the place of commencement."

Let's Talk It Over

Looking over the teachers assembled at the Summerside local convention this fall, one might get the impression that the male school teacher, at least in the rural schools, was in danger of getting to be extinct like the dodo. The preponderance of females over males is always pronounced in rural schools, of course, but never so much as seems to be the case this year. The reason for this may be that, though salaries for rural school teachers are not attractive for either sex, they seem particularly low in comparison with salaries given young men in other pursuits.

We don't suggest for a minute that this growing majority of female teachers will cause a deterioration in the quality of instruction in our rural areas. On the contrary, it may well improve it. There are people who claim that in some of our schools the young fry are so perverse and full of iniquity that they require the restraining hand of a muscular male teacher. True discipline is not a by-product of muscular force, however. It is a manifestation of the spirit. Warren Hastings, a shrunken figure of a man, was able to hold in subjection the hordes of India by his iron will. Many female teachers are able to maintain perfect discipline by the force of their personalities.

Much has been written about the road hog that infests our highways. Has anyone ever complained in print about the sidewalk hog, those car drivers who, in parking, drive their cars up on the sidewalk so far that it is almost impossible to get between them and the buildings on the inner side? We read recently of a man who, confronted with such an obstacle, climbed up on the engine hood, walked across, and jumped down on the other side, leaving a few footprints in the process. The law warned the climber that this was not the way to deal with the problem, but also reprimanded the sidewalk hog for parking his car so far in. Of course, the pedestrian could have crawled under the chassis and gone his way peacefully, but the best thing to do is to report the offending car driver so that he will not repeat the offense.

Continuation Of Arson Case

Mr. Morley M. Bell, appearing for the Department of Justice, Ottawa, on behalf of the Department of National Revenue, income tax division, was the fourth witness heard yesterday in continuation of the preliminary hearing of Wallace Palmer, Borden, charged with arson in connection with a fire at Borden Theatre on April 14th.

Mr. Bell at this hearing, presided over by Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C., stated that his client objected to disclosing any information on the basis of public policy regarding the accused and any amount that might or might not be due by him for arrears of income tax.

Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, Q.C., who is representing the crown, at this hearing, stated that the sheriff of Prince County had been subpoenaed and that the Income Tax Department have a writ issued out of the Exchequer Court. In view of this the crown waived the subpoena to the Income Tax Department.

Mr. Bell filed an affidavit of Mr. James J. McCann, stating the grounds of refusal by his department to appear and give evidence. Other witnesses heard yesterday were Harvey MacDonald, office manager of A. Pickard and Company, Charlottetown, Mr. R. A. Home of Reliable Motors, Summerside. They gave brief testimony regarding monies owing by the accused to the firms they represent.

The only other witness heard was Mr. Oswald Murphy, Portage, R.R., a business partner of Mr. Palmer, who was associated with him in the highway contracting business. He gave testimony regarding the business arrangements and bank standing of their partnership, at the time of the fire. Mr. Somerled Trainor, Charlottetown, is appearing for the accused. By consent the case was adjourned until Thursday morning.

Sport Echoes From Prince County

It's an ill wind that blows nobody good. It looks now as if the fracas at the Victoria Park baseball diamond will have the effect of stirring the baseball heads out of their lethargy so that they will organize an association to govern baseball in this province. If they don't now, a head specialist should be called in to give them a thorough examination.

Some of the comments made by recent contributors to the Guardian Sports Forum really made sense. We agree with the writer who believes that for Summerside to refuse to play baseball with their rivals from the capital city would be much too drastic a step to take. But we cannot agree with the other writer's easy tolerance of the actions of those ball players who assaulted umpire Hogan during the game. He excuses them because of their youth and that is a particularly strong reason why they should not be excused.

Nobody is suggesting that these boys are modern editions of Dillinger or Baby Face Nelson. They are, as he says, just a couple of boys who under the tension of a constant baseball game, and the appointment of impending defeat and elimination, lost their heads and made a serious mistake. If we get many more of these letters such as E. S. H. has written, however, boys both in Summerside and Charlottetown, will begin to think that taking a punch at an umpire puts them in the class with such heroes as Phil Vitale and Hughie Campbell.

It is very important to sell those youngsters the idea that sportsmanship, taking victory without sticking out their chests too far, and defeat with a grin, is much more important than victory itself. If our physical fitness program is not making any progress towards that goal, it may as well be scrapped, and the money put to better use. We think that some action should be taken in regard to those boys who assaulted the umpire, but not too drastic action. They are both promising athletes, and as one gentleman suggests, to suspend them from baseball for any considerable length of time might cripple their athletic careers for good. Their crime against sport wasn't that enormous.

Let's get down to the root of the problem. Cracking down on offenders will never wipe out the rankling growth of poor sportsmanship. Our coaches will have to start with the kids and teach them more than how to lay down a bunt or pivot on a double play. And there is no better background for such instruction than the field of sports. The kids love it and will take the spinach of self-discipline if you mix it well with the sweets of baseball and hockey thrills. Time out for a little tribute here: Johnny Carroll Summerside's American coach, has the correct idea. From what we have observed Johnny gives the boys more than just baseball skills.
