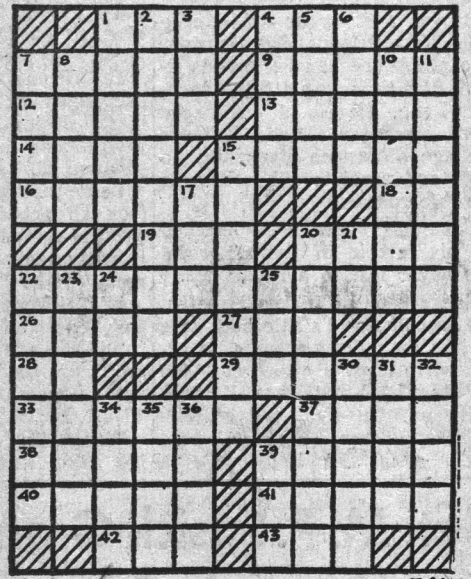

A six spade contract was almost invariably reached. Only the most timid Souths failed to contract for the spade slam after North had shown a spade preference over three clubs.

The slam bidders assumed at least twelve tricks would be made if North had either the king of hearts, queen of clubs, or a doubleton, singleton, or void of clubs.

Mexico City Triumph Was A Highlight Of Ballet Tour

TORONTO (CP)—As the final curtain was rung down in Mexico City's lavish Palacio de Bellas Artes, the orchestra broke into Farewell to Mexico and 2,700 patrons stood cheering a group of young Canadian dancers.

For many members of Canada's National Ballet Company, this was the climax of an eight-month, 20,000-mile tour during which they gave 191 performances in three countries. There were tears in the eyes of many of them as the packed house continued cheering until the music ended.

The company's three-week stand in Mexico City marked the end of a four-phase tour that took it through Central Canada, across the United States, back through Western Canada and then to Mexico. They recently returned to Toronto.

For 15,000 miles of the tour—probably the most ambitious of any Canadian theatrical group—the 76 dancers, musicians and other members of the company travelled by bus with two trucks carrying scenery.

Before they left for Mexico City—by train this time—the company stopped off at its headquarters here to practise 11 extra ballets needed for the Mexico City performances.

Relaxing outside their rehearsal hall over historic St. Lawrence Market, the dancers recalled some of the woes and triumphs of the tour.

"I didn't find a comfortable position on that bus 'till the very last day," one groaned. With little time for sleeping at night, most tried to get some extra rest while the buses moved on to another city.

"We had miserable weather all the way to California," another added. "From there on it was gorgeous."

For the most part they enthused about their reception along the way. But they still found an occasional American like the Los Angeles woman who heard in a lobby saying in astonishment: "They're quite good... You know, there's nothing up there at all!"

The company toured the Atlantic seaboard in February, just in time for some of the worst of the famed "deep-freeze" winter. In sunny Georgia the temperature was zero.

ARIZONA CONTRASTS
At Flagstone, Ariz., the company left town in a "raging blizzard with six inches of snow on the ground." They sweltered that afternoon in the blazing sun at Tucson.

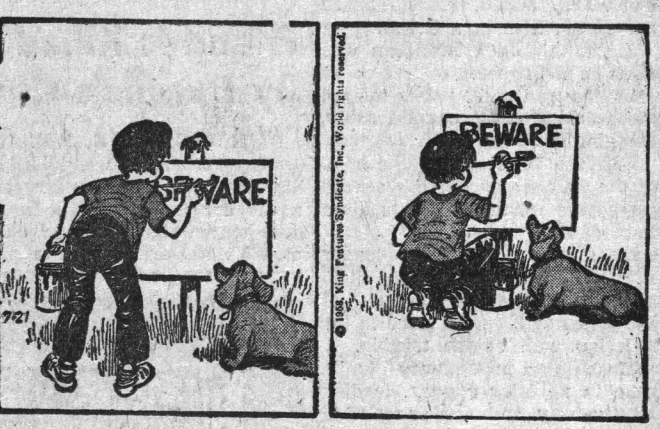
Los Angeles was a disappointment. It rained the entire week they played there.

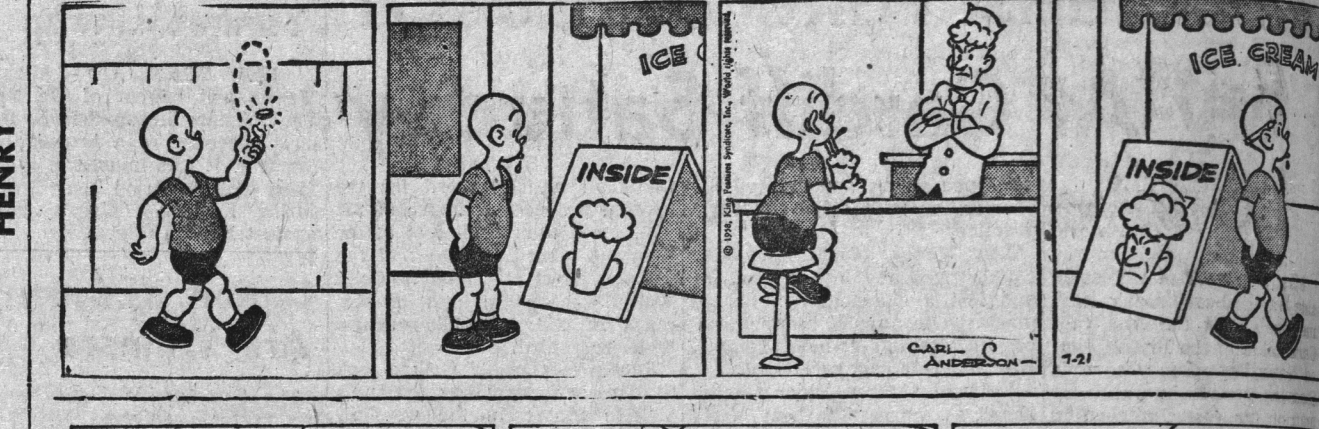
