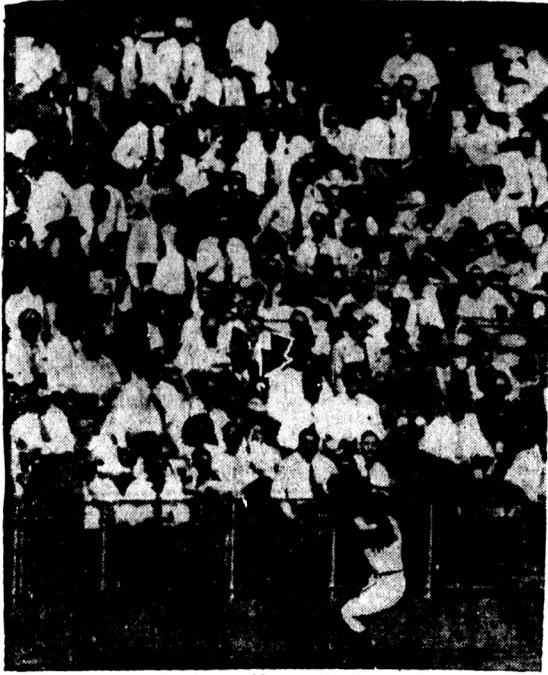


World Series Is Secondary Climax

Hunter was a steady influence behind the plate and hit much better than in the Town League. Mackenzie made his share of bobbles in the field, but his extra-base clouting more than made up for this. This quartet played regularly with the Holman Island champs and you'd have lots of trouble picking another four on the team who contributed as much to the victory. Alan Stewart, of course, was far and away the most important cog in the victory machine, but you'd have to rank the airforce lads in second place.

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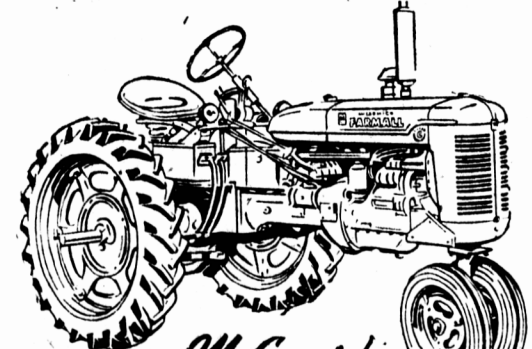
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
