IN MEMORIAM

MISS M. LOUISE MACCOURBEY—Her many friends learned with deep regret of the death of M. Louise MacCoubrey at her home in New Glasgow on Thursday, August second. She had been ailing for some months, and despite tender care and nursing she failed to show any improvement.

Miss MacCoubrey was a daughter of the late R. Y. and Mrs. MacCoubrey (nee Elizabeth Youker) and was one of a family of ten children, four girls and six boys, all of whom predeceased her except one brother H. A. R. of New Glasgow. The sisters were Mary Alice, Mrs. J. H. Simpson, formerly of Bay View, Prince Edward Island and the Misses Susie and Melinda. Her brothers were David Patrick, William Herbert and Richard Andrew, all of whom died when children; also H. A. W. who up to the time of his death conducted a large mercantile business in Sydney, N. S., and L. D. H. who was with his brother in Sydney for some time before opening a store in his native village New Glasgow and H. A. R. who also spent some time in Sydney and later became Assistant Postmaster with his sister in New Glasgow where he now resides in the old seminary.

Miss MacCoubrey had been the efficient Postmistress at New Glasgow for the past forty-four years, and in 1953 was granted a medal from the Queen in recognition of faithful and loyal services for twenty-five or more years. She was known and respected by a very wide circle of friends; a gift of conversationist she took great pleasure in recalling the scenes and memories of former days, and the fullness of retrospect as an earnest of things to come. She was an extensive reader and enjoyed the uplift and fellowship of good literature. A woman with firm religious convictions she instilled in what to her were the basic fundamentals of human beliefs. She had a broad sympathy, and her loyalty and fidelity to her friends was strong and steadfast. Her love and devotion for the members of her immediate and most noteworthy. The floral tributes were many and beautiful.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Lorne Sulman, Percy Dickenson, C. S. Dingwell, Alder Dickenson, Revell Dickenson and Howard Ling. Interment was in the New Glasgow cemetery and was under the direction of Mr. A. B. Cutcliffe of Charlottetown.

New Squeeze On Tight U.S. Steel Supply

CLEVELAND (AP)—Troubles in the Middle East have boomed tanker construction and put an additional squeeze on the already tight supply of steel plates, Steel magazine says.

The weekly magazine of metal-working notes that demand for plates has exceeded supply for the months. While no U.S. government controls on tankers for tax amortization on facilities designed to turn out plates, Steel says.

Twenty-three tankers now are under construction or on order, and plans for another 31 await approval of the U.S. maritime commission, Steel reports. In addition, President Eisenhower has recommended the building of 50 more tankers, the magazine said.

Structural shapes also are in short supply, Steel says, but it discounts reports of a grey market in structural steel.

For the second straight week mills operated at 100.5 per cent of rated capacity in the week ended Nov. 25.

Scrap prices at \$62 a gross ton for the week ended Nov. 21 were up 50 cents to a high for the year. Exports of iron and steel scrap will total about 5,000,000 gross tons this year, compared with 4,500,000 last year, Steel says. The magazine notes Canada has imported 37,028 tons for the first eight months of the year.

Hungarian Refugees Vow To Keep Up Freedom Fight

MONTREAL CP—Six Hungarian refugees, first to come to Canada from their rebellion - torn home land, arrived in Montreal by air during the weekend and pledged themselves to continue their country's fight for liberty from Russian domination.

"Hungarians will keep up the struggle by any possible means, both inside and outside Hungary," said Solyom Andras, a 38-year-old former Budapest auto mechanic.

"About 25,000 Hungarians hope to carry the struggle on from outside the boundaries of their home land," he said, expressing a hope for United Nations Assistance.

Mr. Andras arrived Saturday night. He was followed early Sunday by five others—Mr. and Mrs. Karoly Marton and their daughter Beata, 13 months, and Mr. and Mrs. Edward Pecs.

A total of about 40 Hungarian refugees are expected to arrive in Canada by next Friday. Some 17 are destined for Montreal and the rest for Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver.

WALKED TO FREEDOM

The Martons and the Pecs, residents of a town called Sopron five miles from the Austrian border, walked to freedom 30 minutes before the frontier was closed. The safety in a baby carriage, which was with them Sunday, one of the few possessions they carried out.

Greeting the five - person party at Dorval Airport Sunday morning was a party comprising W. A. McPaul, immigration superintendent here, Liberal member of

Parliament Claude Richardson, representing the Canadian government, and representatives of the Red Cross and Hungarian relief committee.

Representatives of Montreal's Hungarian colony also were out. "We welcome you to Canada as the defenders of our liberty," said Mr. Richardson, who represents the riding of St. Lawrence - St. George.

They smiled and thanked him. Then-bit by bit - they told of their last few weeks in war-battered Hungary before leaving early this month.

As a member of a Red Cross ambulance team in Budapest, Mr. Andras travelled with three other men to the Austrian border for supplies during the early days of the fighting. When they turned to go back, the border was closed.

Andras obtained a little money from a friend in Vienna, was to reach London, and from there arrange passage to Canada. His three friends also escaped.

CHOOSE COUNTRY

In a refugee camp near Vienna, Hungarians were asked what country they wished to come to.

"There were many offers," said Mrs. Veronica Pecs, 19. "But we chose Canada because we thought we would have most freedom here."

Hungary's future is still a guess they said. That the resistance had lasted until now was a miracle, said Mr. Marton. During the thick of the fighting, feeling among patriots ran so high, he said, that he saw one teen-aged girl throw herself under a Russian tank with

Japan Looks To Canada For Her Uranium Supply

OTTAWA (CP)—Japan hopes that Canada will be one of its biggest suppliers of uranium for electricity producing atomic power plants, Ichiro Ishikawa, commissioner of the Atomic Energy Commission of Japan, said Thursday.

He also told a press conference that the Japanese government believes that Canada, as a leading neutral power, could be a major influence in the establishment of an international agency to distribute uranium to countries without supplies.

Trade Minister Howe said Nov. 12 on his return from a 16-day goodwill trip to Japan that Canada may sell uranium to Japan once the United Nations sets up an agency to govern international sales.

Mr. Ishikawa told reporters that Japan will need a guaranteed supply of uranium for atomic power plants in about seven years.

Mr. Ishikawa, Dr. Ryokichi Sagané, director of the Japan Atomic Energy Research Institute and Reinosuke Hara, a member of the institute, are in Ottawa conferring with Canadian atomic officials.

RUSSIAN STEEL

Mid-East Tension Planned For Downtrend In N. Y. Stock Mart

NEW YORK AP—The stock market was lower again last week primarily because of concern over the continuing crisis in the Middle East.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined \$1.90 to \$176.00. The market was lower the first three days of the holiday - shortened week and posted its only daily gain on Friday.

The stock exchange was closed Thursday for Thanksgiving and many in Wall Street made it a long weekend.

The market pattern had not been expected to take any decisive turn because of the holiday lull. But last Monday's decline was the steepest so far this month and additional ground lost on Tuesday and Wednesday sent average prices below previous levels.

Steels and shipbuilding issues continued to gain on soaring industry prospects, given a shot in the arm by new demand for ship plating and oil pipes because of the Suez crisis. Last Monday, steels were especially active and higher, running counter to the general downward trend. Several,

including Republic, Bethlehem, Youngstown and Luken, achieved highs for the year.

Lukens, whose gyrations have been on the spectacular side recently, was delayed in opening Monday until 11:28 a. m. by heavy demand and light supply. It made the tape finally up 10 at 158, then to a high of 172, up 24. It receded as the general market faded and closed at 166 1/2. Friday it closed at 151. Lukens' low for the year was 42 set last Jan. 20.

Canadian issues on the New York stock were generally lower at the end of last week's trading. Aluminum was down 5 to 113 1/4 while Dome Mines lost 1 1/2 to the week at 30 1/2. Hudson Bay Mining was traded at 85 1/2 at 3 1/2. Granby Mining lost 1/2 at 10 1/2. But International Nickel was 5 1/2 higher at 120 9/16.

On the American stock exchange Brazilian Tract, Preston East
