LET'S EAT

An Ice Cream Lunch To Please The Kids

The Chef and I were chatting at dinner in a New York Thruway restaurant.

"Most persons think ice cream is a light dessert," I remarked, "but instead it is a nutritious food, made with about 80 per cent cream, milk and milk solids, about 15 per cent sweetening, a little gelatin or other stabilizer, and sometimes fruits or nuts."

"Then as a dietitian, Madame," said the Chef, "you would not recommend ice cream for dessert at the end of a substantial steak dinner."

"Sherbet would be a better choice, Chef. The ice cream would be more suitable after a light fish or chicken dinner."

"To make a glamorous lighter ice cream dessert, use less ice cream and top it with fruit cocktail."

Duffe Supreme Sundae (Courtesy Corner House Restaurants): In a low glass bowl, put a scoop each of strawberry and coffee ice cream. Add 2 tbsp. fudge sauce. Top with whipped cream and Texas pecans.

Split de Banana Royale (Easier to eat than the traditional banana splits): On individual good-sized plates, arrange 1 ripe banana sliced in bite-sized pieces. Top with a scoop each of vanilla and chocolate ice cream. Spoon over fresh fruit in syrup and heap

with whipped cream.

Tomorrow's Dinner: Snappy tomato juice; seafood platter; whipped potato; spinach; creamy coleslaw; ice cream on sponge cake slices; coffee, tea or milk.

"One of the most popular vegetables in France is the cauliflower," observed the Chef. "Thrifty French homemakers often cook the green stalks on the outside separately and serve them buttered, like asparagus. They're very good, too."

"I like to use cauliflower in making a hot or cold salad."

Sunday Dinner: Tomato Bouillon hot rolls; celery; carrot sticks; grilled ham steak hawaiian sweet potatoes; cauliflower salad fresh fruit cup; coffee, tea or milk.

Grilled Ham Steak Hawaiian: Order 2 lbs. ham steak sliced 1/2" thick.

Mix together 1 tbsp. melted butter, 1 tsp. table mustard and 1 tsp. currant jelly.

Brush this mixture all over the steak. Slow-grill 15 min. or until light brown on each side.

The last 3 min., place on each serving a split slice of well-drained canned pineapple, centered with a cooked prune. Serves 6.

The Chef's Cauliflower Salad: Separate a medium-sized cauliflower into small sections. Boil until barely tender in salted water

Mix thoroughly:

1 cup soft shortening
1 egg
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup sifted icing sugar
1 1/2 tps. almond extract
Sift and stir in: 2 1/2 cups sifted flour and 1 tsp. salt.

Divide dough in half, blend 1/2 tsp. red coloring in one half dough. Roll 1 tsp. each color dough into a four-inch long strip. Place strips side by side, press together at one end and twist two colors together like a rope. Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake about nine minutes.
