Religion and Life

"You cannot have a gentleman's agreement without a gentleman." Neville Chamberlain thought that he could secure peace in our time by making an agreement with Hitler. But the ink was scarcely dry on the paper before Hitler broke every promise he had made.

This was Jesus' answer to the patriotic crowd who wanted to make Him King (John 6). His refusal of earthly power was no half-hearted, hesitating putting aside of a crown which He wished to accept, such as Shakespeare describes in Julius Caesar. When the throng planned "to take Him by force and make Him a King," He offered Himself to them as "the Bread of Life"—the Source and Support of the Life in God.

Time does not change world issues as radically as we think. The free nations are now faced with a tyranny which plans to wipe out the moral and social gains of a thousand years. These would-be tyrants believe fanatically in the alternative they offer and are building up their forces to establish it. Freedom-loving peoples have at last awakened to the fact that power is the only basis on which their dealings with Russia can rest. So far so good. But when we think of force as the ultimate answer to the threat of the hour we are as far from reality as were the patriots of Galilee in Jesus' time.

The patriotic Galileans who surrounded Jesus were not selfish men. Theirs was an ideal which fascinates the world still. Their land, given by God to their fathers, was then an occupied country. The Roman conquerors were as ruthless as any of their breed in our time. In addition to the people's hatred of the alien oppressor, there was their fierce faith that submission of the elect race to a pagan invader was disloyalty to their God. Back of this belief was the splendid heroism of the Maccabean warriors who had hurled back a brutal foe. Any one of these men would have given his life gladly for the emancipation of his race.

The presence of Jesus with His divine power seemed to them a God-given opportunity. He had fed the multitude miraculously. The king who could thus feed his armies had power to crush his foes. Jesus was the leader whom they wanted to compel proud Rome's submission to the elect race thus raised to the height of power and glory. Jesus' answer was His offer of Himself to them as the Bread of Life.

for peace. For years we have had peace pacts solemnly drawn up and signed by representatives of the nations, only to be broken as will by those who relied on war. It was the will to keep these pacts that was lacking. The world needs changed men. Christ stands before the nations now, just as He did in ancient times, calling them to accept what He offers and obey His commands. He alone is able to bring in the elements and release the energies that the world crisis requires. We read about "the Voice of America" speaking to nations behind the Iron Curtain; and why not the Voice of the Christian Church? She alone can offer the grace that the world needs, and accompanying the sacred word is the divine Spirit who uses it to communicate life. China can expel missionaries who brought Christ to her people, but no nation can silence the work of God. We need the spiritual transformation which Christ alone can bring, and He needs us as His messengers to the nations.
