## Famous Secret Agent Dies

PARIS (Reuters) — Wing Cmdr. Forest Yeo Thomas, 62, one of the most famous and bravest of Britain's Second World War secret agents, died at his home Tuesday night. It was announced Wednesday.

Yeo Thomas, ill for 18 months, was a remarkable example of courage and determination during the war.

Under the code name "White Rabbit," he helped organize the French resistance. He was parachuted into Nazi-France three times before he was arrested by the Gestapo and tortured. He refused to give his captors any information.

Yeo Thomas held the George Cross and the Military Cross and was made a Knight of the French Legion of Honor.

The citation for the George Cross said: "He endured brutal treatment and torture without flinching and showed the most amazing fortitude and devotion to duty through his service abroad during which he was under constant threat of death."

On a clandestine mission in Paris in 1944 he was betrayed and seized by the Gestapo. He was held in a prison cell for four days he was continually beaten, whipped, kicked and held by interrogators in cold water with arms and legs clamped. Questioning went on for two months. Twice he attempted to escape.

For three weeks he was confined in darkness in an underground cell.

Recounting his experiences after the war, he said: "It was the only time I fell down-hearted. After four days I felt better and began singing songs including Tipperary."

## Gov't Encouragement To Farmers Is Urged

Encouragement by government to farmers in a number of fields of agriculture was called for in the Legislature yesterday by Frank Jardine (Lib. Prince).

Taking part in the debate on the draft address, Mr. Jardine said the Maritime Provinces do not produce as many dairy products as are consumed. "Every month," he said, "there are imports of dairy products. In winter, cheese and butter come from Quebec and in summer, milk is imported from Nova Scotia."

I recommend that the government take immediate steps to encourage farmers to double their production."

Mr. Jardine said there is a downward trend in dairy production in Canada and with the western provinces concentrating on grain in view of large sales to Russia, there will probably be a drastic reduction in dairy production in Western Canada. He predicted that within five years it will be necessary to set up a dairy council or control board to restrict imports of dairy products into Canada.

POTATO SUGGESTIONS  
Referring to the potato industry, Mr. Jardine said growers appear to be getting little more returns from potatoes.

Mr. Campbell criticized Mr. MacRae on several counts. He said that when potatoes were selling at 80-cents a bag, MacRae had suggested that the farmers hold out for \$1.00. Now the price stands at about 65 cents a bag.

He termed the minister's suggestion "good advice for to help cut the throats of the farmers of P.E.I."

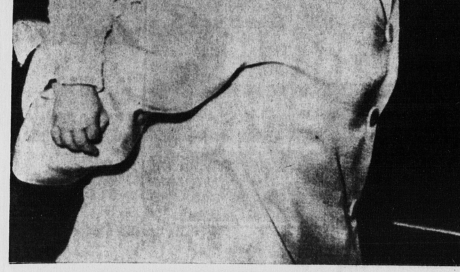
