LOST BABY

It was only a baby, yet when I stooped to pick it up from the bottom step, fear made it crouch down in my hand. Cars whizzed past on the highway directly beside me. Certainly this was no place for a very young bird; so carrying it into the garden, I put the little thing beside a bush near the fence, in hopes that an anxious parent would come with food. There was no great difficulty in determining the species. The lost baby's close resemblance to a young Robin showed that it must be some kind of a Thrush, and we had become very well acquainted with a Veery in the past few weeks. Wilson Thrushes are supposed to be shy, but this Veery had, for some reason, acquired the habit of coming from its home on the far side of the road to forage near our house. It had regular stands on the way—a poplar log, the water pipe, a good sized rock. Early this morning the little family had left the nest, and been guided up to the slope to a woodcock section some yards back of us. Somehow, one baby had evidently been lost on the way. But no kind parent answered the appealing cries. After several hours, we tried to feed poor baby with a raspberry on a match then a house fly. However, that scheme did not work. Not until mid-afternoon did the parents miss a child. Then stealthily, taking a round-about course, a Veery came at last, and little by little coaxed it up the hill to join the rest. We had become so accustomed to the voice of the lost baby that we were able to identify it next day, and for nearly a month could pick it out from its brothers and sisters. Although we had been confident that the Veery's nest lay among hazel bushes near the lake, we were so much afraid of stepping on it that we dared not search during its occupancy. But in September we found it on the ground, at the foot of a small maple. Made of shreds of bark and roots, dead leaves had been woven in, and more were sticking to it on all sides. No wonder it had been hidden from our curious eyes. Now we tried to picture the four greenish blue eggs that must have rested there in early July, eggs that showed the close relationship between Robins and Veeries. Robins, already the young birds, including the lost baby, must be on the way to South America. Are birds equally cautious?

Paper Faces Newsprint And Postal Problems

QUEBEC, July 28 (CP)—L'Action Catholique, Quebec daily newspaper, announced Friday that due to increased newsprint costs and postal rates it no longer will publish a Saturday edition for its 80,000 subscribers. The newspaper said that henceforth its Saturday issue will be 5,000 copies of a remake of its final of three Friday editions with reports of last-minute news. This limited Saturday edition will be distributed by street-sale in Quebec City where delivery boys normally distribute about 20,000 copies of the paper daily. The newspaper, in a front-page announcement, said its production costs have risen by more than \$100,000 a year through recent increases in postage rates and newsprint.

The paper said increased postal charges of \$80,000 a year on rural delivery and extra newsprint cost of \$22,000 a year left it with three economy courses: Increase of its subscription rate from \$7.50 to \$10 a year; increase of the subscription rate to \$8.50 after a suspension of its 16-page week-end supplement; suspension of Saturday mailing to its 30,000 rural subscribers but increase of the week-end supplement to 24 pages. The last course was decided on.

Scallop Dragger Sinks Off N. S.

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S. July 28 (CP)—Two men were injured and several thousand dollars worth of equipment was lost when a small scallop dragger sank here Friday after a gasoline barrel exploded on its deck. The blast ripped a large hole in the boat, but all six men aboard escaped before it sank 10 minutes later. Carman Black, Pugwash, N. S., was thrown 15 feet into the water and Fred Polley, 74, of Caribou, N. S., was believed to have suffered a broken ankle. Both men were taken to hospital where the conditions were described as not serious.

The 50-foot craft, My Boys, was under charter to the Fisheries Research Board of Canada, doing a survey of scallop fishing possibilities in the Cape Breton area. Professor L. P. Chaisson of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N. S., also working on the survey, was not aboard at the time. Others aboard were: Capt. Bert Polley, Caribou, owner of the craft; his son, Fred; Fraser Gregory, also of Caribou, and Jack Lockman, local Fisheries Inspector. Efforts will be made tomorrow to refloat the craft. Most of the valuable equipment was the property of Professor Chaisson.

May Split Power And Navigation Aspects of Seaway

OTTAWA, July 28 (CP)—As the Federal cabinet prepared to meet twice next week, the possibility arose today that the Government might consider splitting the navigation and power aspects of the St. Lawrence seaway project. This means the Dominion, now that the United States Congress again has shelved joint construction of the long-debated scheme, might go ahead alone with the power development and leave the seaway stage in abeyance. Transport Minister Chevrier said today the cabinet, in a fresh appraisal of its over-all position on the scheme, now might have to consider a separation of the seaway and power production phases, though it long has advocated that the two go together and that Canada and the U.S. develop them. "I don't like it, but it is one thing that might have to be considered," he told the Canadian press in a telephone interview from his law office at Cornwall, Ont.

Pilot Killed In Plane Crash

LONDON, Ont., July 24 (CP)—A Royal Canadian Air Force Harvard two-seater training plane crashed Tuesday near Underwood instantly killing the pilot, R. C. A. F. officials at nearby Centuria Air Station reported. The plane dived to the ground on the farm of Hilker Brown, Bruce Township, northeast of Underwood, about 70 miles north of here, they said.

Pursuant to section 8 of "The Prince Edward Island Milk and Cream Producers, Consumers and Distributors Protective Act", Council did and doth hereby approve Order No. 38 of the Prince Edward Island Milk Control Board made by the said Board on the 18th day of July, 1951.—

ORDER NO. 38 Notice is hereby given that on and after the 1st day of August, 1951, the price of pasteurized milk in the town of Borden shall be at the rate of 16c per quart and 8c per pint. The price of fluid milk to the producer in the area of Borden shall be at the rate of \$1.04 per pound butter-fat.

Notice is also hereby given that on and after August 1st, 1951, the price of raw milk in the Hunter River and North Rustico markets shall be at the rate of 15c per quart and 8c per pint.

New CNR Orders For Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 26—Further orders for new railway equipment for the Newfoundland district of the Canadian National Railways by the purchasing department were announced here Wednesday by Howard C. Grayson, general manager of the district. These include ten 30-ton, steel frame stock cars costing \$68,000 to be built by the Eastern Car Company at Trenton, N. S., and three 1,200 horsepower diesel electric road locomotives costing \$630,000 by General Motors.

Previously the C.N.R. had on order for the Newfoundland district ninety 32-ton box and 20 air dump cars from the Eastern Car Company at Trenton, N.S. There was also 100 30-ton flat, six sleepers and three mail cars from the Canadian Car and Foundry Company, Montreal. Ten express refrigerator cars were recently delivered by the Eastern Car Company for Newfoundland service.

The placing of the new orders for the Newfoundland district brings the total value of equipment now awaiting delivery to the C.N.R. across the system to \$104,000, and conventions are exceeded only by Ontario. Next to Nova Scotia are British Columbia and Quebec.

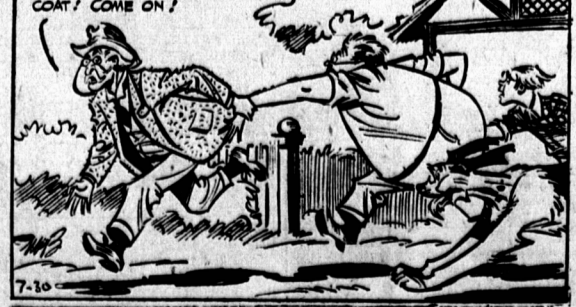
